Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande

Pumpkin!

October is one of my favorite months. I love the crisp air, the color of the trees and the smell of the first wood being burning in the fireplace. But there is one thing I love more than anything else in October... Pumpkin! I love pumpkin!

When I was little, I hated pumpkin. I thought the insides of a pumpkin looked like fish guts and pumpkin pie looked like baby poop. I wanted nothing to do with it!

I was well into my 30's when a friend of mine convinced me to try pumpkin pie. I was reluctant, but I took my fork, cut off a small piece and ate it. The flavor burst in my mouth! It was like nothing I ever tasted before! It was delicious and I loved it!

Now, when October 1st comes along, I gear up my taste buds to eat every pumpkin flavored anything I can find. COUNCIL MEETING – SEPTEMBER 17, 2020

PRESENT: By Zoom: Karen Holle, Tom Cox, Sarah Cox, Sabbastian Wilson-Webb.

In Friendship Hall with masks and social distancing: Pastor Torri, Mary Parrish, Mike Bohannon, Don Hoppe, Heidi Hoppe, Joni Kumpula, Linda Merritt.

Joni called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer.

The agenda was approved as written. Don/Mary. The minutes of the last meeting were approved. Don/Linda

Pastor's Report: Pastor Torri mentioned in her written report to Council many of the things she has been involved with in the past month. Torri feels that Sunday services are going well with a few more people attending church "in person" than before. This is inspiring for the people attending the worship and also for the pastor who doesn't have to preach to a camera. Torri has joined the Comprehensive Planning Team in Hackensack as a way to know the community better.

Torri would like us to review and modify the Policy and Procedures Manual starting this winter with a focus on looking at the responsibilities of each board and ministry team. Torri also told Council that she has been personally struggling to "do church" during this time of corona virus. Torri does not have a secretary in the office and has several leaders of the church that are staying away from church due to concerns about getting ill. This has led her to feel abandoned at times. Karen, Joni, Mary P. and Linda will all help cover office time, especially when groups are meeting in the church or Torri has a meeting she needs to focus on.

Sabbastian will be emailing the Union Weekly out to the Congregation each Monday. This email will let us know each week what is going on that we might be interested in. He will also provide an interface for prayer requests on the website. He is also working on an online prayer list that would be password protected.

Financial Stewardship: Don reported that the income received for August was very good, partly due to a special gift the church received. For 2020 our year to date income is \$115,274 and our expenses are \$99,855. This leaves a positive difference of \$15,419. Don is not sure how income will be for the remainder of the year. He encouraged people to send their pledges in for 2021. To date 30 pledges have been received for a total of \$75,260.

Facilities: Roof work was recently completed on the north and east sides of the church. Don felt that clean-up from the project wasn't done well enough. We are still struggling to get our church phone service working. Currently all calls go to Torri's telephone. This is obviously not a good situation. Joni has been working on pulling weeks that are growing around the church. She has accomplished a lot and the property looks good.

Personnel Board: Karen has been reviewing the old files that are stored behind Sabbastian's desk in the office. Old personnel files should be destroyed and current files should be placed in a locked cabinet.

Ministry Team Reports: Congregational Life: The team is plugging away, calling people and trying to make contact. Don mentioned that money in the CL budget for advertising at the Bear Pause Theater has been re-allocated for a new church computer.

Worship: Heidi talked about the "staff" that helps Pastor Torri with the Sunday service "streaming". The Ericksons have been trained and can help with this and soon Cindy and Mike Gulbrandson will be trained to help. Heidi will order a new license that allows us to stream the words from hymns on Facebook. We also talked about the need to not let people congregate at the outer doors of the Sanctuary before or after the service. We discussed having 2 or 3 chairs at each table in the Friendship hall so people can socially distance after church. Mary Parrish, the Hoppes, and Caesar the church dog will help with this. Karen will call people to make sure they know they can attend Sunday service if they wear masks and socially distance.

Women's Fellowship: Linda will have a women's fellowship meeting on October 8 at 1:00. If you would like to attend by zoom, please let Linda or Torri know. If you would like to attend in person, the meeting will be held in the Friendship Hall with masks and social distancing.

Men's Fellowship: Ron reported that both men and women are invited to help on October 6 with the road clean-up of highway 40. Meet at the church at 9:00 a.m. if you can help.

Christian Learning: Jo was not able to attend today's meeting. The Family Table take-out meals resumed and is serving about 60 people currently. Some of the people coming this fall are new to us.

Justice Ministry Team: White Fragility book discussion begins September 21 at 2:00. This group is closed to additional members.

Moderator's Moment: Joni encouraged us to be kind to each other. We are all under strain in this difficult time.

Meeting Adjourned – Mary/Linda Torri offered a closing prayer. Clerk, Karen Holle

Beginning last month we moved into stage 3 of the Covid-19 Reopening Plan adopted by the Council earlier this year. We remain careful and vigilant, keeping in mind the fragile health of some of our parishioners. We hope you are satisfied with the precautions we are taking and will feel comfortable joining us at worship. There is room for everyone!

- Hand sanitizers and facemasks (in case you forgot yours) are located at the entrances to the sanctuary.



Celebrating the Past - Myra Damm, historian

The early years of growth.

What was the church building like in the early days? According to a report given by Bette Green at the 25th Anniversary, it was as follows:

The furniture in the church was the bare necessities- There was a pulpit and chair for the minister. A piano was given by the young people. Wooden folding chairs (the noisy kind) for seating. A huge box stove in the center of the church with a long, long stovepipe that went up high and then to the front of the church to the chimney. It had many long wires from the ceiling to hold it in place. It burned wood which was furnished by the farmers. In the winter it was never warm. In order to save fuel the yearly pot luck business meeting were often held at the Greens.

The lights were long green wires from the ceiling with a bare bulb.

The church was always open for funerals, whether members or not. As there was no place to serve coffee for the mourners on their return from the cemetery often the pot was on at the Greens.

On January 17, 1917, the 1st Ladies Aid in Hackensack was formed by the congregational women for the purpose of helping with the church expenses. More on this next month.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

Summer is over and autumn is here. The trees are turning rapidly and leaves are beginning to fall. It is a beautiful time of year in this section of God's country.

August was Stewardship Month at Union Congregational Church, and we sincerely thank everyone that has pledged! If you haven't yet made a pledge, please do so, as it is very important in planning for 2021. Please, prayerfully consider making a pledge to support our church and community, and be as generous as possible.

As of the writing of this report, we have received 34 pledges for a total of \$79,310. We hope to receive over 40 pledges and our goal is \$120,000.

August revenue was up significantly, but September may be less than last year. One reason August revenue was up was a significant donation to Union because of the effect that the pandemic is having on our church. Union Church has also begun in-church worship with safety protocols, and it is good to see others in worship.

Strong giving by non-pledging units and completion of pledges by pledging units during the period of October to December, 2020 will be essential to our ability to meet our revenue projections for this year.

We continue to broadcast our worship services on Facebook Live, YouTube, and on the Union Church website.


