Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande My Prayer Journey...

I was with a group of friends a few weeks ago, and we were talking about prayer. Each of them had their own ideas, definition, and experiences with prayer. Some spoke of learning from a young age how they were supposed to pray, but now they view prayer very differently.

As I listened, my mind and heart became in sync with what they were saying. I could almost hear my Sunday School teacher say, "Now Torri, bow your head, fold your hands, and close your eyes." This is my first memory of learning how to pray. I needed to perform a checklist before I began talking to God. Head bowed... check! Hands folded... check! Eyes closed... check! Now I am ready to pray.

As I grew older, prayer became more of an essay paper. There was an introduction (Dear God) or some type of address to who God is, followed by some adjectives that described God. Then I would confess my sin and ask forgiveness, then say a few sentences about what I was thankful for, and after that I began my list of people I needed to pray for. Lastly, I would say a grand ending making sure I used Jesus' name and wrap it all up with an "Amen."

I have to admit, I still pray the essay paper prayer sometimes. You will notice that I say this type of prayer during Sunday services. It isn't bad, just more formal. And I think that is okay.

When I started working in full-time ministry, my boss called

me in his office one day and asked how my relationship with God was going. He caught me off guard, so I stumbled through some type of explanation that sounded pathetic. I mean... seriously, what boss asks that?

He then began to lecture me about how important it is to get up early in the morning to read the bible and pray. "You need to get up early to pray. Giving God the first fruit of your day will help you focus." He challenged me to get up early in the mornings and to read the bible and pray before I do anything else. I reluctantly accepted the challenge knowing it was going to be a miserable experience.

Why? Here are a few things you need to know about me:

- 1. I am NOT a morning person. I do not function well in the morning. Giving God my BEST, will never happen before 8:00 a.m.
- 2. I do NOT like being told what to do, especially when it comes to personal choice. I believe this comes from me being the youngest in my family.

So, the next morning my alarm goes off at 6:00 a.m. I hit the snooze 4 times but eventually rolled out of bed (I literally rolled out of bed). I crawled over to my bible which I left on the floor the night before, and then propped myself up in the corner of the room so I didn't lay back down. I opened my bible, but nothing that I read made sense. I tried to pray but all that came out was, "Hi God." I did this for three days before I realized this was NOT going well.

Over the last 25 years I have learned to pray in many different ways. Ways where I can really feel like I can connect with God. Some ways I like better than others, but all have been of value to me in one way or another.

Here are a few of my favorite ways to pray:

- 1. Driving I love to drive and talk with God. Sometimes I do "drive-by" prayers as I pass the homes of those I know.
- 2. Walking I pray while I walk Koda a lot. I take in the beauty of creation and spend most of my time telling God how amazing I think everything is.
- 3. Drawing When I was younger, I used to draw people that I was praying for. Now, I do more doodling. I know this sounds kind of silly, but I love to let my mind wander in prayer as I doodle.
- 4. Breathing There have been times in my life when I have no words. There is nothing I can say that will express what I feel. So, I breathe. My breaths become my prayers.


We all have different ways of praying. All of us connect to God in different ways, and that is okay. It is more than okay... it is beautiful!

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

September 16th, 2021

Absent: Karen Holle

1:05 Call to Order and Welcome by Mike, and Convening Prayer by Pastor Torri.

Approval of Agenda - Tom/Mary, passed.

Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting - Add Steve & Marilyn to attendees. Tom/Heidi

Pastor's Monthly Report to Council – Pastor Torri indicated that additions/corrections to children/vulnerable adults policy have been made and sent to Executive Committee for approval.

Executive Council Report

- Policy and Procedure for children and vulnerable adults see Pastor's Report.
- Youth programs Are we ready to have unprotected children attend programming at this time? Because of the explosion of COVID cases in Cass County, we recommend canceling programs for children. This would reverse Council's decision to allow Morning Out to begin September 8th. Tom/Stan to approve Exec proposal to cancel programming which includes children.
- Facilities Board Members include Ron, Mike, Kerry Swenson, Stan Kumpula, and Men's Fellowship.
- Board of Christian Learning Discussed splitting the job description into two parts; one for children/family and one for adults. Mary/Tom, passed

Community Meal – This program will become a part of Outreach Ministry Team. Joni/Mary, passed

Financial Stewardship Board Report - Don reported that August income is lower than last year, but expenses were also lower. Overall, income is substantially lower than fiscal year 2020. The church's donation/giving for the rest of 2021 may be low for meeting the budget. Less than projected non-pledge giving and incompletion of pledges are a concern. At this time, we have received 27 pledges for a total of \$57,535. We are hoping to receive another 18-22 pledges for approximately \$39,000 to \$43,000 additional income. The Board will contact households who have not yet pledged.

Facilities Board Report (Ron and Mike) - No report

Personnel Board - Union may want to offer Mike Schmitt a stipend for working on Sunday mornings. We discussed purchasing a \$150 gift certificate to Boulders Restaurant for Mike and Connie. Tom/Joni, passed

Ministry Team Reports -

- Congregational Life (Joni) Team is keeping in contact with those who are isolated. Discussion of Coffee Hour, vaccinations, masking. Joni/Heidi Effective immediately to recommend vaccinations and social distancing, and masks will be required for indoor activities.
- Worship (Heidi) Discussion of the old Bible Heidi will provide a ballpark figure for repairing the bible for future discussion.
- Women's Fellowship (Joni) Done with blanket making. Looking for little service projects. Will continue with prayer bears.
- Men's Fellowship (Stan) Mike Schmitt gave the program earlier this month, explaining the equipment he has donated. Projected programming for October: Gary Dietrich will talk about solar project at St. Paul's, and Norm Moody

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will talk about the advantages of the solar energy program.

- Christian Learning (Jo) Report attached. Team will be reorganizing due to Council vote.
- Justice Ministry Team (Tom) Sept 12th forum was cancelled because group couldn't provide speaker. Outdoor potluck on Sept 21 at Onigum (Covid and weather permitting). (Masks are required in the Onigum Community Center.)
- Outreach (Karen) No report
- Treasure Sale (Cindy) No report.

Moderator's Moment - Mike has received calls from people who wish to leave the church. Congregational Life will talk to those people and report to Council.

MISSION OF THE MONTH—NEIGHBORS IN NEED

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive throughout the month of October, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.

Through ucc.org/justice, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

Hi, my name is Koda, and I am the Church Dog in Training. I want to tell you about my new foster-sister. My human decided to add her to our family. Her name is Lassie. Lassie is friendly, playful, and sweet. Lassie is also big, strong, and stubborn.

She came to live with us about 4 weeks ago. She is from a home where she was tied up on a chain outside all the time. She was not used to being in the house or having manners, but I have been a good foster-brother. So far, I have taught her how to sit, stay, and jump in and out of the car. I have also taught her how to jump on people. My human said that I should not teach her that anymore, but I think it is too late.

Being a foster-brother is exhausting! Lassie is only 1 year old, but she outweighs me by 15 pounds! I had to learn some evasive maneuvers in order to wrestle her. She is like a sumo wrestler, and I am like a ninja! My human tells me that we are quite entertaining to watch.

Life has been a bit harder since Lassie came to live with us. I do not get as much attention as I used to, I have to share the bed, and worst of all I have to share my toys! I love my toys and take very good care of them. Granted, sometimes I lose them or leave them somewhere (like the Friendship Hall or Sanctuary)... but for the most part I treat my toys nicely. Lassie however is on a mission to destroy all toys, including mine. I have had to say good-bye to 4 of my plushies so far, but my human has introduced some more durable chew toys that seem to satisfy her need to rip things apart. I know the more durable toys will go with Lassie when she finds her forever home, she will need them, but I miss my toys. I also miss the attention my human gave me, and I even miss Bandit (the cat). He had to move out to the shed because Lassie mistook him for a squirrel and Bandit (the cat) almost lost his life!



Life is so different now. I miss how things used to be.

I want to chew on my toys, lay in my window, not worry about where Lassie is or if she is going to pounce on me. I just want things to be normal again. But I also know I cannot just think about me. I have to think about Lassie and how she must feel coming all the way up here on a bus, meeting so many different people, getting taken in to a home that she has never been in before. She must have been so scared, so confused, and maybe even felt like she was not safe. I have to remember her perspective too. Maybe I need to be more understanding when she acts out, gets naughty, or tries to destroy things.

I have to admit, Lassie is learning and growing. She is not perfect, but she is going to make a great dog for some family out there. I just need to walk (and play) alongside of her through this really hard time. It is a hard time for both of us, but I think we can do this together.

The Library—New Addition Building

The library is one of my favorite places in the church. It was used for small meetings, was warm, cozy and intimate. There were soft couches and cozy chairs, and lots of books lined the walls on two sides. There was a "family sized" table to gather around for meeting with lots of decisions being made around this table. There was a small sink, and plugins for coffee making. This was a place to go to for those smaller gatherings.

The library was taken care of by volunteers, and the books were available to check out for a "good length of time." Because this is "cabin" country, people would bring books to the cabin, then donate to the church library. The selections were varied and cataloged so it was easy to find a favorite read to take home for those rainy days at the cabin or to drop off at the end of the season so one didn't have to take the books back home. One can find such a variety



from biographies to religion and philosophy, and of course some just fun mysteries and easy reading. There really is no time limit on the length of time to keep a book. It is usually replaced along the way with another book just as good.

If you haven't visited the library room, poke your head in the door and check out this space.

A GREAT POTLUCK DINNER

On Tuesday night, September 21, about 130 people, including Native Americans and the rest of us, gathered for a great potluck second annual Unity Day dinner. (The first Unity Day Dinner was held outside the Courthouse in Walker in the fall before the virus struck.) Tables for six, covered with colorful tablecloths, were set up on the edge of the Powwow field (sacred ground) outside the Onigum Community Center. Other tables were laden with a vast amount of food, some provided by the Casino, but mostly from all the attendees. Our own Pastor Torri was the Master of Ceremonies.

Torri explained to the group that she was a member of the Leech Lake Culture Alliance, a nonprofit organization striving to bring different cultures together through local events like this dinner. Then she introduced Farron Jackson, Chairman of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe, and Annie McMurrin, Mayor of Walker, who both welcomed the crowd and praised the effort by the Alliance to bring people together.

Gary Charwood, of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe, addressed the group in both English and Anishinaabe, and explained the Spirit Plate, in which a plate is filled with a tiny bit of each kind of food on the table and set aside for the Great Spirit. As he spoke, Priscilla Smith, a member of the Alliance, walked the full length of the food tables putting a very small bit of each offering on the Spirit Plate. Pastor Matt Cobb, of St. John's Episcopal Church in Onigum, pronounced a prayer of blessing on the food and the occasion. Then the Elders of the community were invited to go first to fill their plates at the food tables. Although they were supposed to be called up by tables, pretty much everyone got in line after the Elders and discovered there was so much food that no one could possibly sample every dish. Eventually Torri announced that there were to-go boxes and people were welcome to fill them up with whatever leftover food they desired.

Some of the people left soon after they had finished eating. While a drummer had been expected, he had been called away to a family emergency, so Charwood set up a round dance to recorded music, and the remaining group danced in a circle around a group of the tables.

Despite the cool weather, there was great warmth in the people gathered round on this special occasion, and we all look forward to future events planned by the Alliance.

NOTES FROM THE BOARD OF FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

The Harvest Moon was last night, and the nights and days are cooler. Many of our friends have gone or are planning to leave for their winter homes. We had about an inch of rain last night, for which we are happy.

In August, we began our Stewardship Campaign for 2022 with the theme "The Journey from Gratitude to Generosity," which we continued into September. As I write this note, we have received 31 pledges for a total of \$71,935. We are hoping for another 16-20 pledges. 


