

A Candle of Hope in a Divided World



COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

October 21st, 2021

PRESENT: Mike Bohanon, Heidi Hoppe, Don Hoppe, Ron Merritt, Karen Holle, Cindy Gulbrandson, Joni Kumpula, Stan Kumpula, Caryl Allan, Mary Parrish, Gracee Rudkin, Barb Lyall, Tom Cox, Kerri Swenson, Jo Horak, Pastor Torri, (Steve Erickson, Marilyn Erickson by zoom)

Mike called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer.

The agenda was approved as written. Joni/Mary. The minutes were approved. Ron/Joni.

Old Business: Continue the discussion of requiring masks at indoor events at church: Mary read a note from Don and Dolly Olsen regarding the need for masks in church (the Olsens could not physically attend the meeting). They feel that vaccinated people should be able to attend church without wearing a mask if this is their preference.

Caryl Allan spoke for Sandy Tauber and Wendy Cline who also have been vaccinated and would like to attend church without wearing a mask.

Marilyn Erickson agreed that if people have had their shots, they should not need to wear masks. She feels that the real risk is unvaccinated people who come inside the church without masks.

Kerri Swenson commented that many groups require proof of vaccination for admittance to an event.

Steve Erickson felt that we want people to be honest about their vaccination status. We don't want to be checking vaccination cards.

Stan Kumpula believes in science and says the CDC is asking for people to wear masks indoors whether vaccinated or unvaccinated.

Ron Merritt agreed.

Tom Cox indicated that he wears a mask to protect others.

Don Hoppe agreed with this.

Next we moved to discussion about whether unmasked people need to sit in an area that is separate from the area where masked people sit.

Barb Lyall doesn't like the idea of dividing the congregation into groups within the Sanctuary. That seemed to be the general consensus of the group.

Motion: We recommend a mask for those persons who have been vaccinated when participating in activities within the church building.

We require a mask for persons who have not been vaccinated when participating in activities within the church building. Mary/Marilyn/passed unanimously

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report:</u> Torri reviewed her monthly report. She mentioned that there are several people who would like to join the church. She would like to have a service for new members in November.

<u>Financial Stewardship Board:</u> Don reviewed his report to Council. To date, 39 pledges have been received for a total of \$92,935. There are new pledges this year which is encouraging. Several pledges are still expected. Don is asking for budgets from all boards and ministry teams by November 16 so his team can prepare the 2022 church budget.

<u>Women's Fellowship:</u> Joni reported that 8 women met last week for fellowship and dessert and had a really good time. Next time – Everyone bring a friend!! She also mentioned that the Bone Builders group donated \$310 to the church for the use of the building.

Men's Fellowship: This month the men listened to a presentation regarding the installation of solar energy at St. Paul's Church which everyone found very interesting.

<u>Christian Learning:</u> Jo reported that many of the Christian Learning programs are on hold due to the Covid-19 virus. Jo would like to develop some way to reach our youth and families in a safe way, perhaps by zoom. The Community Meal program is going well with 376 meals being picked up so far this fall.

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Tom reported that the team recently had a very interesting meeting. Currently many people on the team are reading the book <u>Neither Wolf Nor Dog</u>.

<u>Treasure Sale:</u> Cindy has recently started listing items to sell on Facebook. She also mentioned that there is a party interested in the old stove that used to be in our kitchen.

<u>New Business:</u> The Game Changers have requested that we allow them to put signage on our property for the Bonna Paulson Memorial Park. A motion to that effect was passed by Council. Joni/Mary/passed

MISSION OF THE MONTH—THE CHRISTMAS FUND

In the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic, the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance, which administers the Christmas Fund, experienced a 400% increase in requests for emergency grants over the previous year. Thanks to the generosity of more than 275 donors to urgent appeals for gifts to the Christmas Fund, UCBMA was able to say "yes" to each of these requests. Most of the donors who responded to these special emergency appeals were older persons and nearly half were first-time contributors to the Christmas Fund. Many are also themselves recipients of Ministerial Assistance. Here are just a few of the notes of thanks received from some of the Emergency Grant recipients:

"I must tell you that before I opened the envelope with the check I prayed that whatever the contents, that somehow I would make the days to come work - and when I opened that envelope with a great amount of trepidation, I could not believe my eyes that you and your Committee granted me even more than I had requested! I am still in shock, and still feeling so very grateful as I sit down with that fear off my shoulders." "Wow, what can I say but a very humble thank you. This is tremendously generous and I never, ever expected it. The best I had hoped for was to cover my recent medical bill. I am surprised and tearfully grateful."

"The emergency grant money arrived in last night's mail. THANK YOU to all who approved this emergency grant. I will be able to pay back loans that were made to make rent. We will also be able to supplement our rent money for quite some time until greater income starts coming in. We are hopeful those days will come." "I'm speechless!"

Faith in Action - The Beginning

I was asked to write an article about Faith In Action, the beginning. I went straight to Marty Mann, our previous Parish Nurse, as she was instrumental in getting this wonderful program started.

In 1998, Marty and Pastor Michael Small attended an informational meeting set up by the Initiative Foundation regarding grant money available for the purpose of forming a faith-based organization to serve the people of Cass County.

As more information was presented, Marty became more and more excited at the possibility that this program could make a real difference to residents of Cass County. Cass is a county with no public transportation, no medical facility at that time, and a growing number of people planning to retire to our area.



This was then presented to the Union Church Council who agreed that the project sounded great and authorized Sheila Hunter and Marty to write a grant asking for funding. Awards for the grants were competitive in nature, and Union was not awarded a grant that first year. We reapplied the following year and were then awarded the grant! The next step was to connect with LuAnn Fransen (a member of our church) about becoming the first director of the program. LuAnn served as director of the program until 2005 and provided the strong leadership and spiritual strength the program needed to flourish.

So many dedicated, talented people have been instrumental in the growth of Faith In Action. The strong base of the organization is the many, many volunteers who care about others and donate their time, smiles, hugs, and love.

Faith is central to the work of FIA for many reasons. While we all experience faith in different ways, many of us share a common belief that community and the world in which we live can be loving and compassionate with the help of friends.

NEWS FROM THE WORSHIP MINISTRY TEAM


We are beginning to work on the 2022 budget, and all the boards and ministry teams have received information so preliminary figures can be presented to the November council meeting.






