CELEBRATING THE PAST

The liturgical paraments in the front of the church decorating the pulpit/lectern and altar runner were placed in the sanctuary in 1991. Pat Coon volunteered to do the the paraments in Hardanger, a Scandinavian form of needlework, done on an even weave cotton.

This project was sponsored by the Women's Fellowship and approved by the Church Council. Later in the year a new hardanger communion cloth was made by Pat Coon that matches the altar cloths. The liners for the cloths were made by Betty Nye. Blue, a new liturgical color, has been added with these cloths and will be used during the Advent season. Pat was very talented and the paraments are so well done. Pat and her husband moved back to lowa some years ago, but her handiwork is a legacy we can enjoy each Sunday.

Summary

December giving was very high, but expenses were also very high. Other income had no significant events and was lower than normal.

For 2023 we have received 47 pledges: 8 new pledging units and 39 previous pledging units. Total pledged at this point is \$110,067 which includes a 7.8% increase in the pledged amount from the returning pledging units. COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

January 19, 2023

PRESENT: Sue Kimmel, Mike Bohanon, Karen Holle, Pastor Torri, Heidi Hoppe, Don Hoppe, Joni Kumpula, Stan Kumpula, Mary Parrish, Linnea Dietrich, Marilyn McKnight,, Steve Frickson

The agenda was approved as written. The minutes were approved as written. Mary/Heidi

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report:</u> Pastor Torri reviewed the Advent collaboration with Pastor Leif and the good attendance at the Christmas Eve service. This is the first year that a Christmas meal and get-together was offered at church. Pastor Torri said that 14 people participated in that event and that it was a lot of fun. She talked about several members of the congregation that she has been spending time with due to health concerns.

<u>Financial Stewardship Board:</u> Don did a great job of explaining the budget his team put together for 2023. The total of budget is \$184,631 and contains a good raise for our pastor and more money in the facility budget for propane and our new cleaning service. Don also presented his revenue projection for 2023 which totals \$175,057, which means we do not expect to have as much income as we have expenses, despite more pledges this year and an 8% overall increase in the size of the pledges. We have money in our Bequests and Special Gifts Fund that could be tapped for the shortfall, but that would require congregational approval. At this point Don told us that he had received a special gift from a person (no name given) of \$31,982 to be used by the church as needed!! The gift was received today and felt very much like a gift from God. This gift will help us greatly over the next few years to balance our budget.

<u>Facilities Board:</u> Discussed a need to re-order some of our cleaning supplies: bathroom paper towels, garbage bags, bathroom toilet paper, etc. Linda Ottman has just placed an order for these items and will order in the future for the church. Discussed the elevator at church: We have a new contract with MEI, the elevator company, to keep the elevator inspected and lubricated for \$800 per year, for a three-year term. If repairs or upgrades are required to keep the elevator running, that will be an extra cost to the church.

Personnel Board: Marilyn reported that the Personnel Board had reviewed the Minnesota Conference Guidelines before rewriting Pastor Torri's employment contract. Torri's total compensation package has increased 8.8% to bring her in-line with UCC churches similar in size to our church. Don reminded us that when Torri was hired 4 years ago, her starting salary was below the conference guidelines because we did not feel we could match the guidelines. The Personnel Board also recommended an increase in hourly salary for the Office Administrator and one additional hour weekly to address additional tasks. Personnel also recommended increasing the pianist/accompanist salary to \$50 per service. Council is in agreement with these changes, and they will be brought to the congregation at the Semi-Annual Meeting. Once the 2023 budget is approved at the Semi-Annual Meeting on Jan. 29, 2023, raises will be retroactive.

<u>Congregational Life:</u> Vera Keep died in December, and the church hosted a wonderful service and luncheon for her family. We are seeing many new people at church which is very exciting.

<u>Worship:</u> Heidi reported that we have had 35 people on average at church for the last 8 weeks. There are also 9 people regularly watching the service online each week. Other people watch the service during the week when it is convenient for them. The bell choir is starting up again. Talk to Heidi if you are interested in this. A liturgist group is being formed. Let Heidi know if you are interested in helping out in this way.

<u>Adult Learning:</u> Linnea talked about the Lectio Divina prayer group she is leading. About 10 people are participating in that on Wednesdays from 3:30 to 4:30. This group will continue until Easter and is open to anyone.

Three retreats are being planned for this summer:

- In June Praying in Nature
- In July or August Labyrinth at Linnea's
- September 13 The Enneagram

<u>Women's Fellowship:</u> Joni reported that Women's Fellowship raised \$283 between the Christmas dinner and the Christmas cookie sale. The meeting in February will be at the Charhouse and will begin at noon. Having fun will be prioritized!!

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that at the last Men's Fellowship meeting the men took the Christmas trees down. The February meeting will focus on fellowship. Easter food boxes are being planned. Thank you, men, for all you do!!

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Sue talked about a spring clean-up project that will involve the Hackensack community and will focus on helping people dispose of large items that need to be hauled to the dump, yard raking, and general rubbish removal. The goal of this project is to improve the general impression the town makes on visitors.

On January 24, the Leech Lake Culture Alliance will meet to follow up on the Juliet Rudie talk about human victimization.

Council approved a small amount of work on the upstairs bathrooms to add locks on the inside of two doors and to improve signage. Heidi/Mary/passed

A book study will begin February 6 on a book entitled <u>The Home Place.</u> More information will be forthcoming.

<u>Fundraising:</u> Steve presented Council with two reports: one covering a recent meeting of church members and friends and their ideas of fundraising projects we might consider. The second report discusses efforts to explore the possibility of establishing a childcare center at our church. Council voted to continue to explore the possibility of using the church as a childcare center. Don/Linnea/passed

<u>Tech Team:</u> Don reported that the Tech team wants to improve the lighting of the front of the church for better quality videos of the church services. The team requested up to \$1,000 for equipment to be taken out of memorial funds. Don/Heidi/passed

It was mentioned at this time that many people would like to have the Sanctuary be quiet before the services so people can enjoy music and can center themselves. We will be asked to "Please don't enter the Sanctuary until you are ready to worship."

<u>Moderator Moment:</u> Steve spoke about how much he and Marilyn are enjoying being part of this church. They also would like us to find a Vice Moderator who could run Council meetings when they are out of town and who could begin to learn how Council works.

New Business: Semi-Annual Meeting – The meeting will be held after worship, January 29.

Pastor Torri offered a closing prayer. Next meeting: February 16, 1:00. Clerk, Karen Holle

TECH TEAM COMMUNICATIONS

The Tech Ministry Team is responsible for the technology equipment and operations at Union Church. This includes the office computers, servers, software and security for the network, wifi and internet. Also the projectors and audio equipment in the sanctuary and Friendship Hall, the equipment for virtual meetings, as well as some other less obvious items.

Most visible is the presentation of media and slides on the screen in the sanctuary and the streaming of worship services to Facebook, YouTube, and the Union Church website.

The "official" Team is fairly new, actually established after COVID changed how Union Church had to operate and reach out to our faith community. We are constantly striving to improve the performance of our equipment and technology. This includes how our computers work, efficiency of communication, collaboration tools and quality of our visual and audio equipment, how our worship service appears to those participating online, and the ease to which everyone utilizes the technology. We don't want just "geeks" to feel comfortable using our technology!

The current TechTeam is Stan Kumpula, Mike Schmitt, Don Hoppe, and John Lindberg, with Pastor Torri joining us whenever possible. We meet every Tuesday morning at 9 AM, except when Men's Fellowship meets.

We are looking for people to join the team. We are especially interested in people to help with streaming our worship service on Sunday mornings. Two people are needed each Sunday – a Director to operate the cameras and sound, and a media person to control the slides on the screen. Mike Schmitt is making the camera and streaming tools much easier for that portion of the process. It is just learning the process – you don't have to know anything about what makes it work. - 1. When I was looking for a Welcoming and Affirming church in Hackensack, on my first search, I found Union. I don't remember if it was the flag or a conversation. I was thrilled.
- 2. As a mother of a gay son, I desperately wanted Union to "Walk their Talk." I have been unencumbered talking about my son over twenty years. I have never had an uncomfortable moment.
- 3. My son lives in Chicago and is married to an African-American man. But the first time the couple came to the cabin alone, I had some anxieties over safety relating both to race and to sexual orientation/expression. I called Pastor Torri and explained my anxieties. She suggested they have her phone number, and the guys were welcome to come to any church activity.

Union is my safety-net. It also serves as my adult son and his husband's safety net. That's priceless.
