Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande

Advent: The Season of Waiting! (Which I'm not very good at.)

The day after Thanksgiving was the time my family put up our Christmas tree every year. We had an artificial tree we would drag down from the second floor storage room and plop down in the middle of the living room. We also had two or three large boxes packed with ornaments, garland, tinsel and lights.

As we began to put up the tree, we worked together like a well-oiled machine. My mom would organize the branches, and I would put them in the long wooden stick. Once all the branches were in...well, not all the branches because one was missing...we moved on to filtering through the ornaments and deciding which ones we wanted on the tree that year. Meanwhile, my brother wrestled with untangling the lights and making sure all the bulbs worked. He hated this job and often cussed a lot. In the midst of the mess, we would always manage to break one or two ornaments, throw out at least a half a dozen bulbs, and fight over whether or not we wanted the tree to "blink". Maybe "a welloiled machine" wasn't the right way to describe us.


Advent is a time where we anticipate the long awaited Messiah. We reflect on a hope for a better future, a peace that transcends all un-

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

November 17, 2022

Present: Cindy Gulbrandson, Karen Holle, Pastor Torri, Heidi Hoppe, Don Hoppe, Kerry Swenson, Joni Kumpula, Stan Kumpula, Mary Parrish, Sue Kimmel, Mike Schmitt, Linnea Dietrich

Joni called the meeting to order in Marilyn and Steve Erickson's absence. The agenda was accepted as written, and the minutes of the last meeting were accepted. Don/Cindy

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report</u>: Torri presented her written monthly report. On December 11 we will be having a Family Christmas Service which will feature members and friends participating in readings, prayers and songs. This day is also Ugly Sweater Sunday.

On December 18 we will be receiving a new member into our congregation. Pastor Torri reported that in the past two years we have had 15 new people join the church. Two members that had left the church are now back, and we have new faces at our services each week. Torri suggested that we could give new people a tour of the church, and we should begin to learn what gifts each new person has to offer our church.

Torri also suggested that we need to have time to get our activities published in the "ON DECK" so that we are letting the community know what is being offered.

<u>Financial Stewardship Board</u>: Don reported that the income for October was about \$5,200 less than the expenses for that month. So far the income for November is very good. Don hopes at the end of the year to have some Carryover for 2023. As of November 17 we have received 36 pledges for a total of about \$90,000. Don hopes for 44 pledges and a total pledged of \$110,000. Please get your pledge into the Board of Financial Stewardship if you have not already done so.

Don asked Council members to get their budgets done for next year so that the 2023 church budget can be put together and presented to the Congregation in January.

<u>Facilities Board:</u> Kerry has been trying to connect with the elevator company (MCI) this month but has been unsuccessful. He has connected with two vendors that handle furnaces because we have been looking into replacing the furnaces that heat our Friendship Hall. These two furnaces work in tandem with each other and Kerry is learning that perhaps only one of the furnaces, the one that gets the most use, will need replacing. Kerry will have both furnaces serviced this fall.

In the lower level art room we have had water entering the building through a window well. Kerry has torn out ruined dry wall and has dug out the window well to make sure it doesn't fill with water in the future. Other window wells outside the church will need to be addressed this spring.

An outside light will be added to the corner of the overhang on our west door so that the driveway is better lit at night. Kerry feels he can tackle this job.

Mike and Kerry will make sure that some of our faucets are left on this winter to, hopefully, prevent our water pipes from freezing. Next year we expect this problem will be corrected.

The lower level door has been re-keyed so we can all open the door without a master key. Kerry is checking our furnace filters and will change them out if needed. Thanks you, Kerry, for all you are doing for the church!!

Personnel Board: Pastor Torri's letter of call for 2023 is being addressed by this committee.

<u>Congregational Life:</u> Today we discussed the fact that we are seeing new people at church almost every week. We are all trying to get to know people that join us for fellowship after worship. We talked about the difficulty the team is having keeping up with calls to the church members that we don't see. We discussed ways to possibly make the team more successful at that.

<u>Worship</u>: Heidi reported that in the last month we averaged 33 people in church and 8 people on line. Motion: No worship service on Christmas morning. Heidi/Karen/passed

<u>Youth and Families:</u> We talked a bit about our last community meal and the meals coming up for Advent. We are working to make sure the meals get advertised so people know about them.

<u>Adult Learning</u>: Linnea is joining us today for the first time as leader of this ministry team. Welcome to Council! Linnea and her friend Laura will be offering a book study, Lighted Windows, during Advent. Linnea will let the Lutheran church members know about this offering in case they are interested.

<u>Women's Fellowship</u>: The Women's Fellowship will be hosting a Christmas luncheon on December 8 for church members and friends. The cost will be \$15 per person, and people need to sign up to attend. The food will be catered by the Char House.

On December 11 the women will bring in Christmas cookies for sale. Please put 6 cookies per small paper plate. Each small plate will cost \$2.00.

<u>Men's Fellowship</u>: Stan reported that at the November meeting the men met with Molly Bursch who spoke about solar energy. In 2023 non-profits will be eligible for a 30% rebate on solar projects. The men are interested in pursuing this project.

On December 6 the men will put up the Christmas trees at church. Stan will try to recruit some men to clean up after the December 11 luncheon.

Food boxes are being prepared by the men's fellowship and the Hackensack Food Shelf for people who need food for the holiday. Many thanks to Dick Kimmel for raising funds to help with this effort.

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Sue reported that the City of Hackensack has asked the Justice Ministry Team to help with city clean-up next spring. The JMT is willing to be part of this project. Sue talked about work that will be done to make bathrooms gender neutral. She will give Kerry a work order describing how the bathrooms will change. She also mentioned a You Tube video called "Call Me Malcolm" about a transgender person's experience. This video was prepared by UCC.org.

Fundraising: Trivia Night will be held on January 14 at 6:30 p.m. after the Back to Hack fireworks.

Joni mentioned that Kokoro wants to start music lessons again at church and will use the room across from the downstairs kitchen to do so.

<u>Tech Team:</u> Today we celebrated Mike Schmitt who has done so much to improve our use of technology for so little money. Thank you, Mike, for all you do for the Church!

<u>Old Business:</u> We discussed the tasks accomplished inside and outside at our last clean up day about a month ago. Next project to be tackled is to clean out the upstairs choir robe closet and to bring up supplies from downstairs for the cleaning crew.

Adjournment and Benediction. No meeting in December unless the Executive Committee meets to discuss the 2023 budget. No January newsletter.

THE CHRISTMAS FUND

Maybe because I am a retired social worker, I have a real concern for retired clergy who may not have made much money during their working years. The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "thank you" gift checks each December to our lower income retirees.

In 2020 \$1.9 million was distributed to people who needed help. Christmas Fund gifts helped pay the rent for low-income retired ministers and bridged the gap for one active minister's family when her husband lost his restaurant due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Christmas Fund donations took care of the unexpected expense of a major car repair, helped a retired minister attend his brother's funeral, and assisted in paying for medical expenses, prescription costs and groceries.

In 2020, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled:

Monthly pension supplementation for 276 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,180,187)

Health benefits supplementation for 89 retired clergy and lay employees (\$274,008)

Emergency grants for 96 individuals and families (\$214,649)

Christmas "thank you" gift checks to 504 retired clergy and lay employees (\$252,000)

United Church of Christ congregations have blessed the Christmas Fund with their generosity for many years. This year, your care and compassion will be especially appreciated by those servants of the church who are facing a time of need.

CELEBRATING THE PAST

Myra Damm, Historian—Food Shelf report from 1991

This report was from 1991 regarding the Food Shelf program in Walker. This is still an ongoing project.

This year, 1991, Cass Lake Food shelf opened up and it's still open. That cut our load in about half. We still have new families coming and some of those who had not come for help for a year are coming again. There are a lot of hungry people out there. Thank you for your continued and continuing support. Without that we could not do the good job we do now. I am so thankful for all the donations, both food and money that come to us. This is the reason we are able to help others less fortunate than we are.

This year we were asked to pack ten Christmas boxes for the Headstart School. There are a few cases where we have given Social Service people a box or two to help a family in desperate circumstances. Sometimes they need food and have no way to get it, no transportation so Social Services gets it to them-as I am thinking of a family with no father. For 1991 we served 1313 people, who represented 342 families who came for food. We gave 20,917 pounds of food away. This represents 19,633 meals according to a set of calculations We have six volunteers most of the time, but have a couple we can call on for extra help.

Present time we are still doing food boxes that are packed and delivered by volunteers from various churches and the Hackensack Lions. These boxes are greatly appreciated by the recipients, so that no one should go hungry over the holidays.

Summary

October giving was low and less than 2021 giving, and expenses were about normal. Other income had no significant events and was lower than normal.

As stated at the semi-annual meeting, our giving continues to be lower than projected, and we expect that our income in 2022 may not fully meet our expenses.

For the long term financial health of Union Church, we need strong giving and completion of pledges in 2022 and strong pledging and giving in 2023.

As of November 20th we have received 38 pledges: 6 new pledging units and 32 previous pledging units. Total pledged at this point is \$93,627, which includes a 7.5% increase in the pledged amount from the 32 returning pledging units.

If you have not yet made your pledge, please do so as soon as possible. Reminder letters for person not yet pledging and reminder letters for completion of 2022 pledges have been sent.

ADULT LEARNING

"A Journey Within", by Linnea Dietrich

As the new Director of Adult Learning, at church on Sunday, November 13, I introduced the vision our committee has for our congregation, calling it, "A Journey Within." I invited us to "fold the wings of our intellect and open our hearts and souls to God's stirrings for each of us." Richard Rohr writes, "Our desire to know more, read more and study more can be another expression of our culture and its acquisitive nature. Knowing God, not knowing more, is the goal." I ask, "How do we do that?"

I believe the best way to know God at a deeper level and to know our true selves, who God created us to be, is by learning and doing spiritual disciplines/spiritual practices that all include deep listening to God in a variety of ways. In the coming months as part of this ministry we will be learning and exploring some of these practices.

We are beginning this process on November 30th with a pilgrimage of sorts by daily reading and meditating on questions from Lighted Windows by Margaret Silf. This is a 5-week study that ends on Epiphany. We will do the daily readings individually and get together on Wednesdays at 4:30 before the soup supper and Advent worship service to share what we have learned about God and ourselves. Laura Baum-Parr will be co-facilitating this with me.

Next we will be dipping our toes into the spiritual practice called Lectio Divina, which literally means "divine reading". This meditation and prayer practice is intended to promote communion with God and to increase the knowledge of God's word. This is part of the process that Pastor Torri uses to prepare her sermons.

Our first session of Lectio Divina will be Wednesday January 11 after the community meal at 5:30. Please mark your calendars and join us for the introductory session.

Curious? Afraid? Wondering what I am talking about? Want to go deeper in your spiritual walk? All are welcome as we explore and learn with each other. Join us as we "Journey Within" together.
