RETIRING THE ORGAN

The organ that sits in our sanctuary has served us for many years. Its musical tones have helped us worship and sing our praises to God. It has been an instrument of delight for many people over the years, and it has served us well.

The time has come for us to retire this faithful instrument and have it removed from our sanctuary. We do this for a few reasons:



- 1. There are parts of the organ that need repair, and it is no longer a viable option for us to fix it. Either we can no longer buy the replacement pieces or the expenses are too great.
- 2. The placement of the organ blocks a fire exit. The Fire Marshal has strongly requested that the fire exit be more accessible in case of a fire.

Our organ has not been used in over 3 years, and it is time for us to say goodbye. We will have a short "thank you" to God for giving us this magnificent instrument and have a formal retirement during one of our services in May.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

APRIL 20, 2023

PRESENT: Sue Kimmel, Karen Holle, Marilyn McKnight, Steve Erickson, Linnea Dietrich, Pastor Torri (by zoom), Don Hoppe, Heidi Hoppe, Mike Schmitt, Stan Kumpula, Mike Bohanon, Cindy Gulbrandson, Caryl Allan, Gary Dietrich.

Marilyn called the meeting to order. The agenda was accepted as written. The minutes were accepted as written.

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report:</u> Pastor Torri talked about a new team at church called the "Events Team." This team would plan different activities at church that would provide fellowship for members and friends, and also might generate income for the church.

Community meals will be offered in May, June, and July followed by a break to assess the program. Special meals may be offered each month for special events.

Pastor Torri also mentioned that Sunday services are now being offered at Birchview Gardens each week. This is going well and is attended by about 15 people who are very appreciative of the chance to have "church" in their residence facility. If you are interested in helping with this ministry, please let Pastor Torri know.

<u>Board of Facilities:</u> Mike B reported that we have had ice dams and leaking water this winter, and he has called Gavin Peterson for an estimate to fix the church roof. He also mentioned that when the Fire Marshal inspected the church recently he indicated that the church organ needs to be moved because it is blocking the fire exit. Because the organ cannot be repaired and no longer sounds good, we discussed having the organ removed from the church. **Motion: Explore the option of having the organ sold, or scrapped. Mike B./Joni/passed.**

Board of Personnel: No report this month.

<u>Board of Financial</u> Stewardship: Don reported that for the month of March giving was typical. For the first three months of the year giving has totaled \$35,451, with other income totaling \$33,912. We currently have a balance of \$30,463 after expenses.

March was Minnesota Food Share month. Union Church contributed \$5,141 to the Hackensack Food Shelf!! The financial report was accepted by the Council. Heidi/Joni/passed.

Ministry Team Reports:

<u>Congregational Life:</u> A new "events team" will become part of Congregational Life. This team will organize weekly community meals in May, June, and July and also may organize several monthly events this summer. **Council accepted the idea of a new "events" team and will cover the shortfall if the event costs more than it generates in donations. Mike/Don/passed.** Also discussed was the idea of having Game Night on Wednesdays after the meal.

Worship: Heidi reported that average attendance on Sundays in the past month has been 35 with 8 households connecting on-line. After Easter Pastor Torri will be focusing on finishing the Genesis work we began some time ago. Joni mentioned that she watched last week's service online and thought the sound quality was very good.

Adult Learning: Linnea reported that Lectio Divina is going well. Each week between 8 and 13 people attend the group.

<u>Women's Fellowship:</u> Joni felt that the last meeting at Paws and Claws went very well. In May the women will enjoy a spring luncheon, and in June we will have a style show. Community Church is interested in joining us for the style show.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that in May the men will enjoy breakfast cooked by Mike Bohanon and Joni Kumpula. Keep your eyes posted for a change in meeting dates for the men's group.

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Sue reported that the JMT is sponsoring a special event – Lunafest - April 26 in the Friendship Hall. A meal will be served at 5:30 (a taco bar), and the movie will be at 7:00. Lunafest is a series of independent films created by women and non-gender conforming directors. This year there are 7 short films for a total of 95 minutes.

Neighbor Helping Neighbor Community Clean-up: May 19 and 20 from 9-3 there will be a community clean-up. Please consider signing up to help on the Union Congregational Church team. Food for volunteers will be available at the Hub. The food this year is being prepared by the church.

Outreach: Don told us today that our church donated \$5,141 to the Hackensack Food Shelf (money collected during the March Food Drive). Thanks to all who were able to contribute!

In May, Don would like to have a special offering for the Union Memorial Scholarship Fund. This fund has been offering scholarships to high school seniors to help with their college expenses. Don will ask people to consider donating to the "available funds" portion of this fund so that we can continue to give scholarships in the coming years.

<u>Fundraising:</u> Childcare project: Gary Dietrich told us today that in the past few years three childcare centers in Hackensack closed their doors. Mann Lake Bee & Ag Supply has indicated that they need childcare services if they are going to be able to continue to do business in Hackensack. After looking at several potential locations for a new childcare pod, it was decided that Union Church's lower level was the most promising location. This project, under the direction of Gary Dietrich and others, is in the process of obtaining a 501(c)3 status. A Board of Directors is being formed, and a project manager and financial manager have been chosen to manage the grant that will be used to remodel space on the lower level. It is hoped that 10-12 children will be able to attend this family childcare pod in the fall. The church has agreed to rent the childcare program space for \$500 per month in the first year of operation.

On May 21, after church, we will have an informational meeting about this project. Gary Dietrich will be present to answer any questions you might have.

<u>Tech Team:</u> Mike Schmitt will be the chair of the Tech team at Union Church. Stan/Don/passed. Mike S. told us that the team will be having a tech sale sometime in July. If you have older, but usable tech equipment, please get it into the church. It will be fixed up and sold, or it will be taken to the dump if it cannot be repaired.

<u>Moderator Moment:</u> Marilyn read to us an excerpt from Jimmy Carter's book about living your faith and talked about how privileged she and Steve feel to be acting as co-moderators at the church.

<u>Old Business:</u> Joni reported that the Woock-Ness papers have finally been signed. She would love for us to celebrate this accomplishment in the near future.

Meeting Adjourned. Pastor Torri offered a Benediction.


THROUGH KODA'S EYES

CELEBRATING THE PAST

The bell choir is a wonderful addition to the music program at UCC. Josephine Majors, a talented all-around musician wanted to start a bell choir when she moved to this area and felt there were many talented and able people willing to play, and our little church could raise the money to make this dream a reality. The effort began by serving church brunches as fundraisers, donations, and several memorials were designated for the project.

In 1990, a generous bequest from Don and Margaret Brown and son Douglas, given in memory of Cecil and Opal Ruby, enabled the church to buy 2 octaves of fine Schulmerich bells, manufactured in Corillon, Pennsylvania. It was a wonderful beginning.

Each bell is a carefully crafted musical instrument on its own. The very smallest bell cost \$400.00 (1990 prices). The larger ones were \$300.00. A full four octave set requires almost 59 bells. Also needed were seven folding bell tables along with foam pad covers, concert gloves, racks, music folders, lights for each table, mallets, and music. A lot of equipment!

Learning to play the bells was challenging and took some practice, but it didn't take long for the group to begin "making music." One of the first rules of a bell choir is to never say "whoops" as new songs are introduced to the players and the first attempts are made to perform them. Counting is a must to keep the sound together.

Just as the bell ringers were becoming proficient, another big break came their way. A generous cash grant from the Five Wings Arts Council was sufficient to expand the bell choir to a full four octaves. This enabled them to extend their playing repertoire to far more complicated music and utilize more members of their practicing twenty bell choir crew. They not only gave performances at the UCC, but also performed in many other facilities in the area which was enjoyable to all who came. The bell choir was formed in 1990 and is still active on a smaller scale for the present time.

MAY MISSION OF THE MONTH

May finishes with Memorial Day, and it is a perfect time to think about memorial gifts and to learn about a memorial gift option at Union Church.

The Joseph L. Major Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in 1983 by Josephine Major in memory of her husband. Later this fund was combined with the George Hoppe Scholarship Fund under the new name of the Union Church Memorial Scholarship Fund. Since that time, the fund has grown by the addition of gifts in memory of many members (most recently, Sandy Tauber) and friends of Union Church and other gifts.

The current Memorial Scholarship Fund has its principal in saving, investments, and CDs, but only the interest and dividends from the investments are available to be distributed as scholarships.

One or two \$1,000 scholarship have usually been given over the years. But because of reduced funds in the Available Fund category, only one \$500 scholarship will be awarded this year.

We suggest you consider a memorial gift this month, and it be dedicated to the Union Church Memorial Scholarship Fund, Available Funds. The additions to this category will allow Union Church to continue to offer scholarships to deserving students.

A JOURNEY WITHIN - Adult Learning

"Do you feel called to walk a more contemplative path?" This is the question that the Center for Action and Contemplation, based in New Mexico, often asks at the end of a podcast sponsored by their organization. I ask you this same question. "Do you feel called to walk a more contemplative path?" The CAC defines contemplation as a "way of listening with the heart while not relying entirely on the head."

If you are curious and want to journey along with us as we explore the contemplative life, we invite you to try Lectio Divina, an ancient spiritual prayer practice that we began doing in January of this year. There will be an introduction to this practice Wednesday, May 31 at 2:00 pm followed by a time of prayer using the Lectio form. If you want to start earlier in May, give me a call and I can meet you before our regular meeting and give you a quick tutorial. You don't need much instruction to be able to engage in this prayer practice.

Lectio Divina will be meeting all Wednesdays in May at 3:30 pm in the UCC library. See the April newsletter for Karen Holle's story of what Lectio Divina has meant to her.

Thursday, July 13, at 1 pm at Bonna Paulson Observatory, the park past UCC, Stacy Hirschi and I will be telling our stories of pilgrimage. September 2022, she and I walked 500 miles across Spain completing the Camino de Santiago. Come to learn more about this contemplative practice and our experience sponsored by both the women and men's fellowship groups.
