Things I have Learned in the Last Two Years...

November 1st marks two years of being the pastor at Union Congregational Church. It has also been two years since I have moved to the Hackensack community. I have experienced many things along the way, and I would like to share a few of those things with you:

1. Wood – When I first moved here, I didn't know how to order wood for my fireplace. I had no idea what a cord was. So when I ordered wood and was asked how many cords I wanted, I didn't want to sound dumb, so I said "Two". A few days later, I arrived home to find a mountain of wood next to my shed. I now know that a cord of wood is 4ft. high, 8ft. long and 4ft deep.
2. Fire Starters – The first few weeks of trying to start a fire in my fireplace, it took me 45 minutes to get it going. I was using newspaper. But, I was informed that birch bark is the best material to start a fire. So I tried it, and sure enough, I almost burnt the house down!
3. Minnesota Insect Seasons – There are 4 seasons in Minnesota, but Minnesota also has insect seasons. In the late spring it is tick season, early summer is horse fly season, around late June and July is mosquito season, and then in early fall is tick season again. I have been told to "Just get use to it"... And I have.
4. Cold Car – I have learned that leaving my car outside in -10 degree weather—or colder—is not a good thing. The battery drains and it won't start the next day. So, I purchased a portable battery jumper just in case I don't have anyone around to help me. I have used it twice now.
5. Frozen Pipes – I have always known pipes freeze, but never experienced it until my first winter here. It was a Sunday morning and my pipes were frozen. I needed to lead a church service, so I packed up some clothes and make-up, went to church in my pajamas and got ready for the service in the bathroom.
6. Bear – I have seen two bears this past summer, and I was very excited about it. When I first moved here, I lived in a member's cabin on a lake until my rental was ready to move into. One day, the member came over to tell me that there was a bear spotted two lakes down and I needed to be aware. I took the information very seriously and told her, "Okay, I will be more aware."

Later that week I was talking with my sister on the phone and I was relaying the bear information to her. She then asked, "What does two lakes down mean?" I paused and realized... I have no idea how far two lakes down is! I still don't!

7. Waving – One of the first things I was taught when I was interviewing to be the pastor was, “We wave here.” I was walking down the street to the Chainsaw Event and I was walking with one of the members. She waved to every car and every person standing outside. After the 4th or 5th time, she turned to me and said, “You need to know this... We wave here.” So I followed her lead and I started waving to every person and car I saw.

8. Community – I was in a member’s kitchen drinking tea one afternoon. We were having a nice discussion about the personality of the community. I will never forget her words when she said, “It don’t matter if you like someone or don’t like someone. If they need help, you help them. If they are stuck in a ditch, you pull them out. That’s what we do here.” And I never forgot those words. And it is true.

I am proud to be part of this community called Hackensack. Thank you for bringing me here and allowing me to be your pastor. I love it! And I am grateful for this community, this experience and look forward to what else God has planned for me here.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES – OCTOBER 15, 2020

PRESENT: *By Zoom:* Karen Holle, Tom Cox, Heidi Hoppe.
Present in Friendship Hall: Caryl Allan, Joni Kumpula, Mary Parrish, Don Hoppe, Mike Bohannon, Jo Horak. Pastor Torri was on vacation.

Joni called the meeting to order and offered a convening prayer. The agenda was approved as written. Don/Heidi. The minutes of our last meeting were accepted. Don/Tom

Pastor's Report: Pastor Torri is on vacation today. Her monthly report was accepted by Council. Torri has met Pastor Bob who has taken over leadership of St. Paul's Lutheran church in town. Pastor Bob is interested in working with Torri on Advent services this year.

Pastor Torri and the worship team have worked hard to improve the Sunday live streamed services. As technical knowledge on the team grows, the possibilities to steam in special music and guest speakers grows.

Financial Stewardship Board: Don discussed his report which includes income and expenses through the end of September. Year to date income = \$115,268 and year to date expenses = \$111,404. Once the PPP repayment is forgiven, that money (\$11,100) will be added to the total income for the year. Thirty seven pledges have been received for a total of \$87,170 for 2021. If you have not submitted your pledge please do so.

Facilities Board: The church telephone number is now working. (218-675-6300) There is a phone in the kitchen, in the secretary's office and in the pastor's office. There is no church phone downstairs.

Personnel Board: Karen and Joni will call a meeting soon to conduct annual reviews of church employees.

An Executive Board Meeting was recently held to address a number of issues. Please be thinking about possible new people who might be willing to serve on the church council for 2021-22 and beyond.

Ministry Team Reports: Congregational Life: The team recently met to discuss the people in the Congregation that we are responsible to call. We are working on a prayer telephone list to be used when important information needs to go out to the Congregation. This list would include people who do not have internet and do not get email.

Worship: Heidi reviewed the people who are helping with the Sunday services. She indicated that it would be helpful to have more ushers to make sure people don't bunch up after or before the church service. Mike Bohannon mentioned that he feels the music quality could be improved. Heidi will look into this.

The first Sunday of November (Nov. 1) will be a "service of remembrance" for those in our church community that have died in the past year.

Women's Fellowship: Linda scheduled a meeting for last week which was not attended by anyone. Joni will help Linda with the planning and advertising for the November meeting which could have a holiday theme.

Men's Fellowship: The men cleaned up Highway 40 at their last meeting.

Christian Learning: Jo mentioned that the community meal program is doing well with 152 people being served so far this fall. \$331 has been received in donations. New people come each week and many families come for meals. Thanks to Sue, Mike, Caryl, Don and others who help with this project.

Bible Study has moved indoors to the Lower Level of the church on Monday mornings.

Jo is thinking forward to the Christmas season and will work with Worship and Pastor Torri to see if there is a way to involve children in a virtual Christmas program.

Justice Ministry Team: The book study for White Fragility will be ending in another week. Several people are interested in getting involved in the next book study.

Moderator: Joni mentioned that Bone Builders will be meeting upstairs in the Friendship Hall starting Monday. Only regular members are invited to participate in "in person" meetings.

Joni has finished decorating the Sanctuary for fall. (Gorgeous!!) The Book and Thimble group will meet at the church next week.

Don Hoppe mentioned that the Lions will be using our dishwasher to clean eye glasses that have been donated before they are sent to possible recipients.

It was also suggested that at future Council meetings we add an item, “Joys and Concerns” to the regular agenda. Meeting was adjourned. Mary/Caryl. Next meeting November 19. Clerk: Karen Holle

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Mission of the Month – Neighbors in Need

A United Church of Christ sanctuary church offering immigrants refuge in the Arizona borderlands will soon be offering a place of hospitality, support and hope on the Mexican side of the border for people who find themselves deported from the United States.

The Shadow Rock UCC Sanctuary Action Team and the Rev. Ken Heintzelman, are in the process of establishing Hope Station Nogales, in Sonora, Mexico.

The thought is Hope Station can be a place of transition, a place where people who are deported but have family in the U.S. can find a meal, safe lodging and assistance. Priority will be given to individuals who have an attorney and an administrative remedy in process, and no criminal record. Hope Station will be a community in formation for people who share the goals of reuniting with their families and working, rebuilding their lives.

"The core of the Gospel is new life," said the Rev. Bill Lyons, Southwest Conference Minister. "Hope Station gives deportees a chance at new life near the border so they can stay as connected to their families as possible, mitigating the overwhelming temptation of crossing the border illegally because the only life they know is on the other side of the wall."

The Shadow Rock Sanctuary Team will be able to answer that question with the support of UCC Justice and Witness Ministries.

"Justice and Witness Ministries was pleased to be able to support Hope Station ministry through the awarding of a Neighbors in Need (NIN) grant last fall," said Bentley deBardelaben, Executive Associate, Justice and Local Church Ministries. "Our grant committee felt it was important to stand with this community who bravely offer support to people who await decisions in their pending cases within the immigration court system. Furthermore, we believed that ministries such as Hope Station could be replicated in other communities across the country that are seeing families ripped apart due to hyper-vigilant ICE agents and citizens who are fearful of people who may not look like them."


It is the same with seasons. Spring, summer, fall and winter are all very different, but they are all very beautiful in their own ways. You just might have to look more closely sometimes.

Celebrating the Past – Myra Damm, historian

The Early Years After the Church was Built

The churches were built fairly close to each other on the Main Street which was #371 with the timeline about 1917. Our church, the Catholic Church, and St. Paul's were built fairly close in time and location. As the church membership was growing, so was the town. In the Hackensack History book, it lists a number of things that were happening in the town, which tells of the growth of the community.

The Hackensack Consolidated school, was built and finished in 1921. Electricity came to the town in 1923-24. Constable and Justice of the Peace was appointed 1st term in 1921. Dr. Button was appointed health officer. Village Hall was built in 1925. In April of 1921 the purchase of a cemetery site for \$16.00 an acre. A newspaper was being printed. Buildings on 1st St. and 2nd St. were required to be built of brick or other fireproof material. Permit for a hardware store in 1923. Two gas station permits were issued plus much more.

Growth was happening as the town struggled to become established. More business were coming, hotels were being built. It appears that most of this was in the 1920s. the three churches were growing, adding new members, and in 1927 the church was reorganized under a new constitution. The three organizations within the church at this time was Sunday School, Ladies Aid, and Young People's Society. The church membership at this time was 42. More next time.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

Our hearts are content


Hats gloves scarves and snow
