Advent: Waiting in Our Mess

The day after Thanksgiving was the time when my family put up our Christmas tree. Our tree was artificial, so we needed to drag down from the second-floor storage room. It was crammed into a huge box that slid nicely down the staircase and pushed to the middle of the living room. We also had two or three large boxes of ornaments, garland, tinsel and lights that we stacked in a corner until the tree was up.

My family put up the tree like a well-oiled machine. My mom would organize the branches and I would put them in the long wooden trunk of the fake pine. Once all the branches were in... well, not all the branches because one was missing... we moved on to filtering through the ornaments and deciding which ones we wanted on the tree that year. Meanwhile, my brother wrestled with untangling the lights and made sure all the bulbs worked. In the midst of the mess we would always manage to break one or two ornaments, throw out at least a half a dozen lightbulbs and fight over whether or not we wanted the tree to "blink" or not. Maybe "a well-oiled machine" isn't the right words to describe us.



In the end, empty boxes that once held all the decorations were littered throughout the house and countless ornament hooks were lost in the carpet. It was a lot of work to get ready for Christmas! But in all the mess... we were ready!

I remember one year looking at my mom and asking, "Okay, what's next? What do we do now?" My mom said,



"Now we wait."

"Wait! Wait for what?" I asked.

"Christmas!" she replied.

I remember thinking, we have to wait? We did all this work and now we have to wait? I hate waiting! But that is what we needed to do. So every year we waited.

We are entering the season of Advent... the season of waiting. We take this time to prepare our hearts and minds to find the rhythm of God's heart. This year is a little different from other years. We are going through this Advent season and preparing for Christmas during a pandemic. It is a messy time, but in that messiness, God is there. God continues to be in our mess. God chooses to be in our mess.

COUNCIL MINUTES – NOVEMBER 19, 2020

PRESENT: by Zoom: Pastor Torri, Karen Holle, Joni Kumpula, Tom Cox, Don Hoppe, Heidi Hoppe, Ron Merritt, Linda Merritt, Mike Bohanon, Sabbastian Wilson-Webb.

Joni called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer. The agenda was approved as written. The minutes of the last meeting were approved with one correction.

Joys and Concerns: Council members discussed a few church members they have concerns about. Joni mentioned that the small funeral service Pastor Torri officiated for Barb Payne's family was very special.

Pastor's monthly report: Pastor Torri mentioned that Bud Lienes' son, Ted had called the church after the All Saint's Day service to say how meaningful that service had been for him and his siblings. Torri also mentioned that she has not been feeling well and has been tested for covid. Results next week. In the meantime, Torri will preach from her home on Sunday and will not be present in the sanctuary.

Because of increasing cases of Covid in our area, Bone Builders will not be meeting to exercise. The Executive Committee meeting December 14 will be by zoom only. There will not be a Council meeting in December.

Financial Board: Don reported that November income at this time is about the same as the total for November for last year. He hopes that all pledges will be completed soon and that non-pledge donors will continue to give. He also hopes for a good "special giving" at the end of the year.

Forty one pledges have been received for a total of \$93,984. Don's team will be working on the 2021 budget soon and all committees and boards are encouraged to get their budgets in as soon as possible.

Facilities: Ron reported that the church needs two furnaces to replace the ones that heat the fellowship hall. He wants that cost in the 2021 budget and estimates it will be about \$18,000. Sand has been delivered near the basketball court to be used to fill bottles for use on slippery surfaces. Ron has heard from RREAL Solar recently and has learned that our solar power project will not be tackled until next year.

Personnel: It is time to begin thinking about raises for staff at Union Church for 2021. This will be part of our 2021 budget process. Several of our members are ready to "retire" after many years of service to the church. We will consciously begin to talk to others about taking a leadership role at Union. Pastor Torri reminded us that we need to have good job descriptions of our current positions if we want to be replaced next year so people know what is expected of them if they agree to a church job.

Clerk's Report/Outreach/ Newsletter Deadline: Karen will write an article for the newsletter on The Christmas Fund. The newsletter deadline is next Tuesday, Nov. 24. Please get your articles into Sabbastian.

Ministry Team Reports: Congregational Life: The team continues to check on people in the congregation. Christmas cards will be sent out in December to spread holiday cheer. Please call friends and church members to wish them a good holiday season in these difficult times.

Worship: Heidi reviewed some of the plans for Advent this year. The services will be held on Wednesday nights in December at 5:30. They will be virtual services that include the Holden Evening Prayer. Heidi and Pastor Bob from St. Paul's Lutheran will perform the music and Pastor Torri will read scripture. This will be very uplifting for members of both St. Paul's Lutheran Church and Union Congregational Church.

Pastor Torri, Jo and Heidi are working on the special Family Christmas Service which will be on December 13. The families will dress up and tell the Christmas story through photographs while Torri reads the scripture. Charlie and Becca will provide music for the prelude and the postlude this day.

Members of the Congregation are being encouraged to video (with their smartphones) a 5 – 10 second greeting to church members wishing everyone Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Send the video to the church and Sabbastian will incorporate the messages into December church services. The deadline for getting your video in to the

church is December 1.

Women's Fellowship: No physical meeting will be held in December, but individuals will help with the Christmas card project. If you would like to write out some Christmas cards call Karen Holle for more info.

Men's Fellowship: Ron reported that the men are purchasing chickens for the Thanksgiving food baskets. Share and Care will provide the rest of the food for the baskets and will arrange delivery to recipients. The men will also provide meat for December food baskets.

The men's fellowship will have a zoom meeting on December 1. Details to follow.

Christian Learning: Jo was not able to attend this meeting. The traditional Holiday Meal will be available for pick-up on December 16. After this meal, the Family Table folks will be taking a two week break before the Wednesday meals start up again in January.

Moderator Moment: Joni encouraged us to call people who may be lonely and to ponder our blessings. This is a time when kindness and patience will go a long way toward making life easier and more fulfilling. We hold those people who are struggling during this holiday season in our hearts and prayers.

New Business: The Semi-annual meeting will be January 24, 2021.

Next Council meeting is January 14, 2021 at 1:00. No meeting in December and the January meeting is one week early to get ready for the semi-annual meeting. Executive Committee meets December 14. Meeting adjourned. Clerk: Karen Holle

A Testimonial: From Rev. Cathy Barker

“My father, a UCC minister, died of cancer at age 54, just after Thanksgiving. I was fourteen; my brother and sister were grown and had to go back to their homes. Mom and I were lonely, confused about the future, and our financial picture was very shaky. Further, we faced a bleak Christmas . . . we didn’t even want to think about that.

“Then came a check from the Christmas Fund. We were both deeply touched that our national Church somehow knew that we were in need and gave us this gift. It didn’t solve all our troubles, but it made it possible for us to have Christmas. We felt the love behind the gift, and that was transformative.

“Throughout my mother’s long life, she gave faithfully and gratefully to the Christmas Fund, and I have done the same through the churches I have served as pastor. I’ve often told our story, because I want people to know how important it is to reach out in this way.

“When the pandemic caused such upheaval, and an appeal came from the Pension Boards telling about the increased need for emergency funds, I sat right down and wrote a check. My husband and I are glad we could help.”

“The Christian story, from Genesis until now, is fundamentally about people on the move—outgrowing old, broken religious systems and embracing new, more redemptive ways of life. It’s time to move again.”

The drop-in church attendance has many people worried that the Christian faith is dying. Christian faith is not dying, but it is embarking on a once-in-an-era spiritual shift. For many, the journey has already begun.

In *The Great Spiritual Migration*, McLaren explores three shifts that define this change:

1. Spiritually, growing numbers of Christians are moving away from defining themselves by lists of beliefs and toward a way of life defined by love.
2. Theologically, believers are increasingly rejecting the image of God as a violent Supreme Being and embracing the image of God as the renewing Spirit at work in our world for the common good.
3. Missionally, the faithful are identifying less with organized religion and more with organizing religion—spiritual activists dedicated to healing the planet, building peace, overcoming poverty and injustice, and collaborating with other faiths to ensure a better future for all of us.


McLaren invites readers to seize the moment and set out on the most significant spiritual pilgrimage of our time: To help Christianity become more Christian.
