What is Going On?

Notes from
Rev. Torri Vande Zande

This past year of isolating and social distancing has been hard in many ways. One of those ways is the disconnect many feel with church. We don't get to talk, hug, or get the latest news on what the church as a whole is doing during this time. With that said, I decided to do my best to update you on what is happening at Union Congregational at this time.

LEADERSHIP

The Executive Council has started meeting on a regular basis over the past few months. I have appreciated their willingness to help guide the church and me through this difficult time. We are revisiting our by-laws, going through our Policy and Procedure Manual, and making sure they are up to date and match our mission, our beliefs, and ministry style. This is only the first step in a series of steps, so I am excited to work with leadership teams and ministries on this later in the year.

One of the major items we will be working on this year is new leadership. We are looking for individuals who have leadership skills that will help lead our congregation into the future. The leaders we have now are amazing, however they cannot do this forever. We are actively looking for ways to have Union Congregational here for the long haul. The word we are using is "sustainability". It has come to the point that if new leadership does not form, the church will not exist. Sustainability in leadership is foundational for Union to continue to be a light in this community.



BOOK STUDIES:

In Person/Zoom Book Discussions have, surprisingly, been engaging many people. We did a few book discussions on white privilege, and it has led to other topics. From January 20th through March 3rd we will be discussing a book called "The Great Spiritual Migration" by Brian McLaren. March 10th through April 21st we will be going through the book "The Four Agreements" by Don Miguel Ruiz. I am looking forward to seeing where God will lead these groups.

CHURCH:

The Christmas Eve service was very different. Advent season exhausted our worship team (and me), so we were very grateful the National Office put together a Christmas pageant for all churches to use. It was a variety of music videos from churches all over the country. It showed the diversity and unity of the United Church of Christ, and it was very fun to watch.

We are continuing to stream through Facebook, YouTube, and our website. We have modified and updated our technology the best we can at this time. We are looking into getting a new camera that can be mounted, and also a mixer and Bluetooth connection so the sound quality will be much clearer and have a better mix.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES – 21-1-21

PRESENT: by Zoom: Ron and Linda Merritt, Karen Holle, Tom Cox, Heidi. By social distancing in Friendship Hall: Pastor Torri, Don Hoppe, Jo Horak, Mike Bohannon, Caryl Allan, Joni Kumpula

Joni called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer.

The agenda was accepted as written. The November 2020 minutes did not get emailed and will be approved at our next meeting.

Pastor's Monthly Report to Council: Pastor Torri is interviewing a person who could work in the office 6 hours a week to handle some of the tasks that Sabbastian cannot handle from home. Torri will be interviewing the candidate by zoom next week.

Pastor Torri has working with Pastor Bob from the Lutheran Church to plan services for the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is February 17 this year. On that day ashes will be offered from 10:00am until noon at Union. People will be able to drive up to the church to receive ashes without getting out of their cars. The service will be at 5:30 that evening at Union. Ashes will also be available at that service.

Financial Stewardship Board: Don Hoppe reviewed the 2021 budget and several recommendations from the Board of Financial Stewardship. Because of generous donations to the church and forgiveness of the PPP loan there is a carryover of \$28,000 from 2020 to 2021. With pledges of just under \$100,000, estimated non-pledge donations, money from the Fetzer Institute, and a transfer of money from Christian Learning and Communications, we have projected income of \$173,000. Actual budget total for 2021 is just under \$170,000. The 2021 budget includes a \$2,500 raise to Pastor Torri's total package. Money for conferences and mileage was reduced in the Pastor's budget by \$3,000. The budget includes additional money for church insurance which went up 25% this year. The budget removes money for the Morning Out program. All Boards and Ministry Teams have tightened their budgets as much as seems reasonable.

Recommendations from the Board of Financial Stewardship that were addressed and voted on at this meeting:

Remove funds in the budget for Morning Out – Council discussion focused on the fact that the program costs about \$3,000 a year when it runs and has not had good attendance for the year before Covid stopped it completely. Jo mentioned that she has a benefactor in the community who is interested in financing Morning Out if it re-starts in the future. Council discussed this at length and requested that a program description and a plan be presented. Jo will create a proposal for youth programs that Council can review at our next meeting.

Motion: At this time funds for the Morning Out Program will not be included in the 2021 church budget. Don/Caryl/passed

Motion: Remove the Treasure Sale from Christian Learning and make this a separate income producing Ministry Team under Council - Caryl/Heidi/passed

Motion: Remove all Non-OPs funds and accounts designated by board or ministry team and place those funds in an unrestricted account for use by the church as needed. This would not include money for outreach and missions for which the church is a conduit to an outside organization, ie, Faith in Action, Food Shelves, etc. Council agreed with this decision of the Board of Financial Stewardship. Mike/Karen/passed

All expenses that are not budgeted or would be over budget need approval from the Board of Financial Stewardship or Council before the expenditure is made.

Motion from the Executive Committee that Pastor Torri receive a \$2,500 addition to her total salary package for 2021. Don/Ron/passed

The budget presented by the Board for 2021 was approved by Council and will be presented to the Congregation by zoom on January 24.

Facilities: Ron discussed the \$7,000 that was spent last year on roof repair and this year we have had no ice issues on the roof. He also discussed the increase in church insurance costs and is willing to make calls to look for a policy that is less expensive.

Replacement of church stove and oven: Mike Bohannon has found a gas stove and oven that he wants to purchase to replace the existing electric stove in the upstairs kitchen. Don will check to see if we have memorial or available B&SG income that could be used for this purpose. Council voted to replace the old stove. Jo/Ron/passed

Personnel Board: Joni asked us to please be thinking of people that could serve on Council in the future.

Men's Fellowship: The men's group will meet in-person in the Friendship Hall and by Zoom in February. More information to follow.

Justice Ministry Team: Tom mentioned that a group called ISAIHAH located in the Twin Cities will be presenting a workshop by Zoom this Sunday that discusses issues of equality for all persons in the state of Minnesota.. Tom will send the information concerning the workshop to Council members.

Newsletter: The deadline for the February newsletter is Tuesday, January 26. Sabbastian will put the newsletter together and Torri will ask Julie Rono to help with the printing and mailing of the newsletter.

New Business: Semi-Annual Meeting: The meeting is scheduled for 10:45 on Sunday Jan. 24 after the worship service. People can attend in person and by Zoom.

CAESAR'S OBITUARY

Caesar Sky Vande Zande born Oct. 30th, 2013 passed away January 14th at 2:30 p.m. at the Cross Lake Hospital due to an aggressive cancer in his stomach. He was 7 years old. Caesar was born in Washington, Iowa to a good owner who did not know how to train Caesar. He was dropped off and left at a friend's house. The new owner's dog attacked Caesar multiple times and caused injuries to Caesar's ear, tooth and neck. Caesar was dropped off at Paws and More in Washington, Iowa and told that no one wanted him.

Staff at Paws and More healed Caesar's wounds and trained him so he could be adoptable. The director saw his personality and began using him as a therapy dog to local assisted living centers, dementia facilities and as a general ambassador to the community.

June 26th, 2017, Caesar was adopted by his human, Torri Vande Zande. Caesar was socialized more with other animals and younger children through Torri's dog walking service and connections she had with family and friends. He was Torri's constant companion.



October 19, 2018 Caesar and his human moved to Hackensack, MN. He was installed as the official "Church Dog" of Union Congregational UCC May 19th, 2019.

Caesar's duties at church included greeting visitors, visiting residents at Birchview Assisted Living, Morning Out and VBS special guest, body-guard to the pastor, ambassador to the community and all-around calming presence during council meetings.

Caesar is survived by his human Pastor Torri, Bandit (the cat) and numerous members of Union Congregational UCC in Hackensack, MN who he claimed as his pack.



Thank you to all those who came to say good-bye to Caesar a few weeks ago. Thank you also for all the cards, words of comfort, and donations made to Paws and Claws in his name. Union was truly Caesar's "pack" and he loved everyone here.

COMMUNITY MEAL SPOTLIGHT

About twenty years ago the church began *Mother's Morning Out* and *Gifts of the Heart* programs for children and their families in the Hackensack area. The *Gifts of the Heart* program started at 4:00PM and at 5:30PM the kids went on home. At some point, about 15 years ago, we decided that it would be a good idea to invite the parents in at 5:30 for dinner so we could get to know them. People in the Congregation took turns making the meals for these events and the food was always good.

At some point Sue Johnson became the "chief cook" for the *Family Table Program*. Before the COVID-19 virus hit us, Sue Johnson would often make and serve food for 40 adults and children. She cooked the meals in the small kitchen downstairs and people gathered in the Lower Level to eat and talk. Often people who came to the meals brought cookies or other offerings for the meal. Community members came for the meal as did church members. Sue always watched the weekly sales and purchased food at a very good price.

In March 2020, when COVID-19 became a reality, people could not meet safely and the program changed to a 'take-out' format. Sue, Mike, and the rest of the Meal Team moved their culinary operation to the larger Commercial Kitchen on the Upper Level. We practice recommended COVID-19 guidelines with hand washing, sanitizers, masks, gloves, and general kitchen safety. A program designed for kitchen 'best practices' was completed by our main staff earlier. Meals are packed in eco-friendly containers in line with the 'Stay Green' policy of Union Church. Both take-out and delivery meals use social distancing practices. We are so glad to see all of you, but we can only wave!

We are currently serving 70-80 people weekly with a blend of kids and adults coming on Wednesday between 4:00-5:30 PM. Some of them know us from Family Table, and we are glad to see them. There are church members who are happy to have a hot home cooked meal made by Sue and Mike. Others who come for a meal have no connection to the church, but have heard about this program through word of mouth, or have seen the orange sign near the church or on the highway.

When people drive up to get their meal or receive a delivery, they are happy to reconnect with friends and acquaintances. Many folks may be starved for human contact, and this program offers a bit of that too. Perhaps we're serving body and soul? We do know we are thrilled to see everyone who comes or gets a delivery!

Meal menus vary weekly but always include a hot entree, a healthy side dish, and a tasty dessert. Please contact Sue or Jo for info or special dietary needs. You can reach Jo at (651) 274-2145.

Upcoming meal options may be given at time of pick-up and delivery.

Community Meal has always been a Mission Project of Union Church so meals are available at no cost to all who attend. Donations are gratefully accepted.

Community Meals are served each Wednesday between 4:00-5:30 PM at Union Church. Address is 401 East Lake Avenue, Hackensack, MN. Look for the orange signs on the highway and near the church.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

We hope you had a joyous and blessed Christmas and holiday season. We are now well into 2021, and our winter is about one-half over. We have been lucky not to have been too cold or snowy.

We first want to say a big **THANK YOU!** This is for all our members and friends who supported Union Congregational Church so generously during 2020. The Board of Financial Stewardship and the Church Council were anxious and concerned about how the church would weather the pandemic and continue to be the church. With your financial support and understanding, we feel that we “weathered the storm” exceedingly well.

Worship, communication, and ministry has been very different and challenging, and unfortunately these challenges still exist. We are doing things differently, things are constantly improving, and there appears to be light at the end of the tunnel.

Late November to early January we were working with the church boards and ministry teams in planning for 2021 and formulating a budget. Working together, we were able to balance our budget requests with our projected revenue. On Thursday, January 21 the budget was presented to the Church Council, and with a few adjustments, was approved to be presented to the congregation at the Semi-annual meeting. On Sunday, January 24 at this meeting, the budget of \$169,883 was approved.

A packet was emailed to members and friends before the semi-annual meeting with the budget, a report from the Board of Financial Stewardship, and reports of finances for 2020. We look forward to 2021. Financially we are OK at this time, but we continue to be concerned about the future and long-term sustainability of Union Church. We must all work together to continue supporting and expanding our ministry to our church and our community.

Growth of the Church

I have been following along with the Hackensack history book about the growth of the town in relation to the churches. Our church was located on what is now Highway 371. St. Paul’s church was located where the old bakery was. (Stained glass windows were still visible in the back room.) The original Catholic Church was also located on the corner of Lake Ave. (That building was moved to its present location in the parking lot of Scared Heart and is still used for flea markets and rummage sales.)

Our church location is listed as being next to the old bakery building which would put us where the Conoco station would have been. It had to have been congested on Sundays having these churches so close together.

As some of you know our “old” church was moved to its present location in 1958. (The old lot was sold for \$525.00). The property for the new space was given to the church by Mrs. Rose Lathrop. She had given this land to the church in 1951. The plot of land was not used, and in 1954 there was talk of selling it, but it was decided to move the church building to this location and by 1958 this was accomplished.




