Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande

### What does it mean to be human?

### Summary

January giving was much better than January 2022 giving, and expenses were very low. Other income was extremely high, mostly because of the very substantial donation received.

The final total of 2023 pledging is: pledges: 48 of which 9 are new or returning pledging units and 39 are previous pledging units. Total pledged is \$110,267, which includes a 7.8% increase in the pledged amount from the 39 returning pledging units. Pledging for 2023 is more than \$10,000 greater than for 2022. Thanks to everyone who pledged and those who support the church.

February giving through the second week of the month is already better than it was for the whole month of February 2022.

The Board of Financial Stewardship, with Church Council approval, has moved \$125,000 of dedicated Reserve Saving funds into CDs because of the improved interest rates we have been able to secure.



# **COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**

February 16, 2023

Present: Don Hoppe, Linnea Dietrich, Mary Parrish, Mike Bohanon, Sue Kimmel, Heidi Hoppe, Pastor Torri, Karen Holle

Don Hoppe is running the meeting today as our Moderators are absent. The agenda was approved as written. Linnea/Heidi/passed. The minutes of our last meeting were approved as written. Heidi/Sue/passed.

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report:</u> Pastor Torri mentioned that the owner of Birchview Gardens, the senior living facility next door, has asked if our church might be able to provide a worship service for the residents. We discussed helping people from the residence get over to the church on Sunday mornings. We also discussed the possibility of streaming our service into the facility as it happens. Council agrees that more research on this request will be conducted.

The facility owner also asked if residents from Birchview could come to our church in case of an emergency, such as a fire. Council members wondered why the Community Center across the street from the facility couldn't be used as it would be easier to get people in wheelchairs into that building. Pastor Torri will pursue both of those questions.

Pastor Torri gave members of Council information on ways to promote activities of our boards or ministry teams.

<u>Financial Stewardship Board:</u> Don reported that January income for the church was very good, and expenses for the same time period were low. Our year-to-date balance is \$37,167, and total assets are \$306,977. Don requested that Council approve a motion to: **Move \$100,000 of church funds into a 15-month CD at First National Bank and \$25,000 of church funds into a 9-month CD. Mary/Heidi/passed.** 

The financial report was approved as written. Sue/Mary/passed.

<u>Facilities Board</u>: Mike reported on a couple of things he has been working on for the church. We discussed the need to eventually determine a way to clean the downstairs of the church. Our cleaning service only cleans upstairs, and the downstairs is beginning to look a little dirty. This spring when we have our spring clean-up, the lower level of the church will be addressed.

Board of Personnel: Pastor Torri's 2023 Letter of Call has been written and signed.

<u>Ministry Team Reports: Congregational Life:</u> There will be a meeting of this team next week to address upcoming needs. The Community Meal was discussed: Community meals will be offered twice a month through May 10. At that point it will be discontinued for the summer.

<u>Worship</u>: Heidi reported that in January the average in-person worship numbers were 29 with 8 people on average online. She also mentioned that there were 14 people at last week's Super Bowl party.

<u>Adult Learning:</u> Linnea reported that about 10 people are participating weekly in the Lectio Divina prayer group.

<u>Women's Fellowship</u>: Nineteen women met in February for lunch at the Char House. Everyone had a really fun time! Future events are being planned.

<u>Men's Fellowship</u>: The men will be preparing Easter baskets again this year. There are sufficient funds in the men's account to handle the cost.

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Sue reported that on May 19 and 20, there will be a community clean-up in Hackensack. People within the city limits can request help with their lawn work, with painting needs, or with trash removal, among other things. Many local organizations will be asked to provide volunteers to help with the work. Karen suggested that perhaps the church could provide the food for the volunteers that weekend as part of our contribution. Other JMT projects mentioned by Sue include the Leech Lake Culture Alliance work with the issue of human trafficking, new signs for our upstairs restrooms, the current book study, <u>The Home Place</u>. Look for more details of this team's work in the newsletter article written by Sue Kimmel.

<u>Outreach</u>: Don mentioned that the Hackensack Food Shelf asked the church to help again this year with the Food Drive which occurs each year in March. Karen will write the letter that will go out to people in the congregation and will provide an article for the March newsletter. Don would like to see us sponsor a "mission of the month" several times a year. He requested that we use the month of May to ask our congregation for donations toward the scholarships that the church has given in the past to youth entering college.

Other people are interested in having special offerings for Faith in Action, the Family Safety Network, and the new women's shelter in Akeley. More discussion on this next month. We need an Outreach Coordinator to head this work up.

<u>Fundraising:</u> On Thursday March 2 at 3:00 p.m., the Fire Marshal will be inspecting the lower level of our church to see if our space could be made suitable for a childcare center. Don Hoppe and Mike Bohanon will be part of this visit.

<u>Tech Team:</u> Lighting has been purchased for the front of the church and will be installed soon. This lighting will improve the quality of our video streaming. The tech team needs additional members and will work on attracting people to help.

<u>Old Business:</u> The Conservation Easement papers have been signed and notarized for the Woock-Ness property.

<u>New Business:</u> Pastor Torri's sabbatical – Don asked that we begin to think about the fact that Torri will have a 3-month sabbatical in 2024, and we will need to decide how we want to manage the church in her absence.

Meeting adjourned. Torri offered a benediction. Notes, Karen Holle Next meeting is March 16, 2023

### **Music Committee Report from Annual Meeting 1991**

"The music department had a productive year in 1991. In 1991, we started with the formation of the women's Sextette, which is now under the direction of Ann DeGray. This group has been a great addition to the music of the church.

In April, we applied for two grants from the state and the county for the Bell Choir. To our delight, we received both. These monies enabled us to purchase new tables, covers, stands, and music. We also received memorials for Roy Able, which have made it possible to order more bells.

The singing choir has grown. We had four new members join just during the past two months. We are looking for a new director to take Josephine's place and co-direct with Sheryl. Josephine would like to devote her time to the Bell Choir, and Sheryl cannot take on the choir by herself because of her busy schedule.

Another problem to be worked out in the next year is to find an organist to assist Peg Abel and eventually take over the position. We have had several leads, which have not panned out, but there has to be someone out there somewhere."

This is a partial report from this committee. Next month, we will feature the history of the bell choir, which is an important fixture in the music of the church.

# REMEMBERING SANDY

By now many of you know that member/friend, Sandy Tauber died suddenly on February 12th. Sandy came to a Women's Fellowship luncheon on February 9th and seemed to enjoy herself fully. Just a couple of days later we learned that Sandy had died suddenly at home. What a loss for her friends and her family and for those of us who attend Union Congregational Church! Sandy, you were well loved by so many and are greatly missed. Below is a portion of the obituary printed on the Whispering Pines website for Sandy:

"Sandra Kay Tauber, age 74, passed peacefully into eternal life at home on February 12, 2023. Sandra was born in Monticello, IA on December 10, 1948, to Merle and Mayeda Jansen (Weers). She grew

up on the family farm near Amber, IA. After attaining her business degree in court reporting, she worked as a legal secretary in Cedar Rapids, and while in town met her husband-to-be, Charles Tauber. On March 4, 1972, Charles and Sandra were married, and two children resulted, Michael and Angela. When the kids were still small, the family made the move to Hackensack, MN.

Sandra was very involved with Union Congregational Church in Hackensack, where she enjoyed singing in the choir, playing bells, and teaching Sunday School. Sandra had a green thumb and could be found tending to her plants and flowers on warm summer mornings. Sandra was well liked wherever she went and had many fine and long-lasting friendships. Above all, she was a proud grandma who loved each of her grandchildren and enjoyed watching them grow." It was Sandy's wish to not have a funeral; therefore we felt the need to share this information through the "Union News."

### MISSION OF THE MONTH — HACKENSACK AREA FOOD SHELF by Karen Holle

The Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign brings together organizations, businesses, faith communities, and individuals to help keep the 300 food shelves statewide stocked throughout the year. For forty-two years Minnesota FoodShare has campaigned for donations on behalf of our food shelves. One in eleven Minnesotans experiences food insecurity right now, and many of those are children or senior citizens.

Hunger Facts MINNESOTA:

A record-breaking 5.5 million visits were made to food shelves during 2022 in Minnesota, up nearly 50% from 3.7 million visits in 2021.

Minnesota's charitable food system (food shelves and food banks, meal programs, etc.) continues to run at capacity. This has been exacerbated by rising inflation and the end of various financial and food supports established during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

I spoke to Cheri Westphal of the Hackensack Food Shelf to see what they were noticing this year. Cheri told me that SINCE JANUARY OF THIS YEAR 15 NEW FAMILIES HAVE COME TO THE FOOD SHELF TO ASK FOR HELP!! Many of these families have senior citizens living in them who are unable to make their income cover the high cost of food.

If you would like to support the local food shelf in the month of March, please send a check to the church and indicate that the money is for the food shelf. This year all money collected will go to the Hackensack Area Food Shelf unless a note is written in the memo line of the check indicating you would like your donation to go to the Walker Food Shelf.

Thank you for your generosity. Working together, not one person in our community will go hungry. **WE CAN AND DO MAKE A DIFFERENCE!!**





