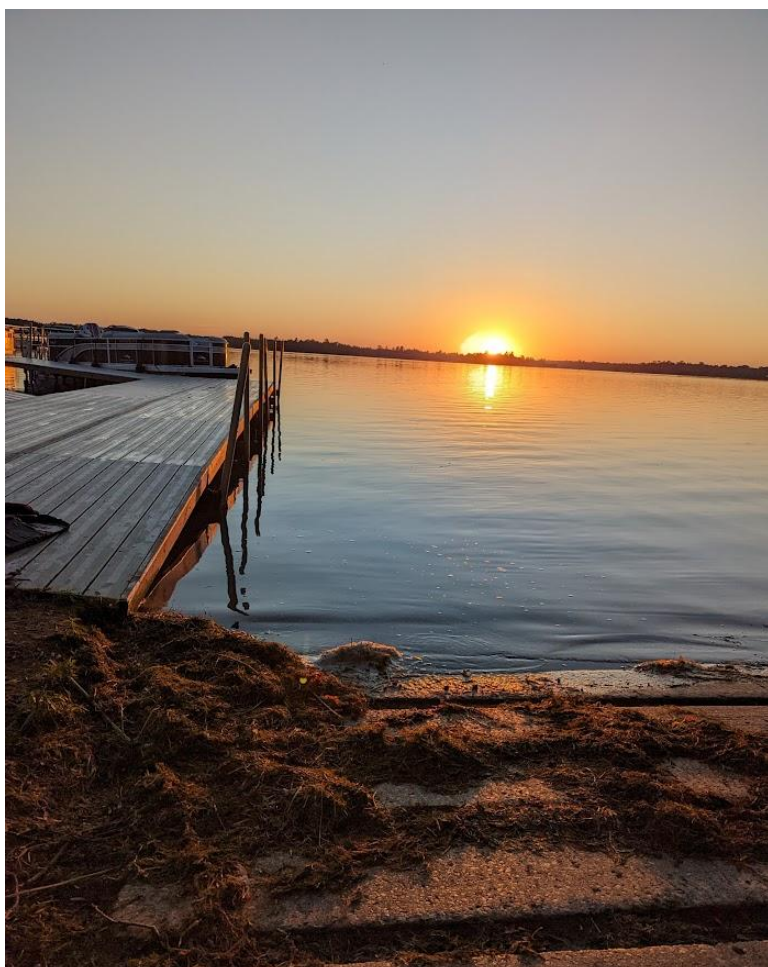

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

JULY 20, 2023

Present: Heidi Hoppe, Don Hoppe, Cindy Gulbrandson, Sue Kimmel, Pastor Torri, Marilyn McKnight, Steve Erickson, Karen Holle, Joni Kumpula, Stan Kumpula, Mary Parrish, Linnea Dietrich

Marilyn called the meeting to order. The agenda was approved as written. The minutes of the last meeting were approved. Linnea/Joni.

Pastor's Monthly Report: Pastor Torri highlighted the projects she has been involved with this month and talked a bit about “imagining” the possibilities for our church in the future. The Minnesota Conference will be offering “re-imagining grants” to churches in the state that have ideas of new projects they would like to work on. We expect the grant process will be open this fall, and we want to be ready with our ideas for projects.

Board of Facilities: The project to replace thermostats in the church and some of our less efficient lights is underway.

Board of Personnel: Marilyn reported that in August a team will meet to begin to plan for Pastor Torri's sabbatical which is scheduled for 2024.

Board of Financial Stewardship: Don reported that June was a very good month for the church regarding both giving income and other income (Treasure Sale). A total of \$22,723 was taken into the church, and expenses were \$14,232 which left a positive balance of \$8,491!

The Stewardship Campaign will begin in August and will run for two months. Don stressed that because we are at the end of our Fetzer grant, and because we will have additional expenses in 2024, we will need to step up our pledges for next year if we are to meet our expenses. **If you would like to help with the 2024 Stewardship Campaign by speaking some Sunday morning about what the church means to you, or in some other way, please contact Don.**

Ministry Team Reports:

Congregational Life: Pastor Torri and Joni highlighted several events this month. Work continues on the updated directory which is scheduled to be finished in August. Torri has had the privilege of conducting a baptism for Barb Lyall's great-granddaughter! A lovely memorial event was organized by Mary Hertzman to celebrate the lives of Carole and Al Griggs. We expect a more formal service will be held next year. Visits and calls continue to those people who are unable to join us in person for worship and fellowship.

Trivia night was a success last week. Community meals, game night, and movie night will be discontinued in August to give our cooks a break.

Worship: Heidi reported that our sanctuary is filling up this summer which is wonderful! The average attendance in the past 4 weeks is 61 with 7 households listening online. A hymn sing is planned for July 30, and we discussed possibilities for special music in August. Nine people attend regularly on Sunday afternoons at our Birchview “satellite” church. This has been a wonderful experience for all involved.

Adult Learning: Linnea reported that 7-12 people attend the Lectio Divina program each week. Other adult learning programs are being planned.

Women's Fellowship: Joni reported that Stacy Hirschi did a wonderful job at the last Women's Fellowship meeting describing her Camino de Santiago walk last year in Spain. About 20 people attended that program. August 10 there will be an ice cream social and a discussion that will focus on some planning for future events.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that the men are planning an all day trip to Hibbing to view an open pit mine. The men are also planning a chili and pie supper for October 21 and invited the women of the church to assist with pies. This fundraiser will support the food boxes that the men distribute at Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

Justice Ministry Team: The Justice Ministry Team partnered with the Leech Lake Culture Alliance to participate in the Welcoming Babies Celebration at Cass Lake. Heidi, Cindy, and Sue created a basket that was filled with baby food and was given away as a door prize at the event. This traditional celebration includes educational booths and giveaways to families who had babies within the year and are members of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe.

On July 6th the JMT met for a discussion of issues that affect water quality in our area. Future efforts will focus on working with other water protection groups and to conduct water testing.

Members from the JMT attended the Isaiah Rural Organizing Project meeting on July 10. At the meeting participants were trained to talk with people from our community about their feelings and concerns in a way that is non-judgmental and encourages honest conversation.

Hackensack's National Night Out is August 1st - 5:00-7:00 p.m. at the Hackensack Community Center. This is an event where we can learn more about public safety and is a very interesting event each year.

Fundraising: Cindy Gulbrandson reported on the progress of the preparation for the childcare pod. Cindy asked us to consider and vote on the next decision that needs to be made regarding new walls and doors to our lower level. We agreed that the staircase from the main floor of the church to the lower level will not be part of the childcare space. The old "computer room" will also not be included in the childcare space. A wall will be built that separates the church's space from the childcare space. **Motion: To wall off the fellowship hall area and the kitchen on the lower level. A door will be installed in the new fellowship hall wall to allow access between the childcare space and the church space in case of an emergency. A "window" will be installed in the lower level kitchen that allows for a view from the kitchen into the main childcare area. Joni/Linnea/passed.**

Other work that needs to be done downstairs: Update of old furnaces and duct work to improve the heating and air-conditioning system for the childcare pod. Updating one of the bathrooms in the pod to make it wheelchair accessible, pulling out old wallpaper in the nursery to make the walls ready for painting, pulling up old carpet downstairs to get the floors ready for new carpeting. The childcare group also is in need of another board member. If you are interested in helping with any of the last three of these needs, please speak to Sue Kimmel or Cindy Gulbrandson.

Steve Erickson mentioned that he needs help with the Fundraising Committee. Please talk to Steve if you are interested in being part of this group.

Moderator's Moment: Marilyn talked about how happy she is to be part of Union Church and how proud she feels to invite friends to attend our services. She truly believes that we are bringing God's love to others.

New Business: We talked about rooms in the lower level of the church that will remain available for the church's use and what we need to do to get them more usable. The rooms are: the old computer room, the craft room, the music room, the storage room, the book room. Many of these spaces have in the past been used for children's programs or for the Treasure Sale. The Council will begin to make plans for these spaces.

Conservation Easement Celebration: Joni is excited to celebrate the Woock-Ness Conservation Easement on July 29 at 2:00 p.m. in the Friendship Hall. This will be publicized in the local newspapers for people to learn how to form conservation easements which allows for land to be protected from development.

Old Business: The agenda for the semi-annual meeting was discussed. The meeting will be July 30 in the Friendship Hall following the service.

Motion to Adjourn: Heidi/Stan. Next meeting August 17.

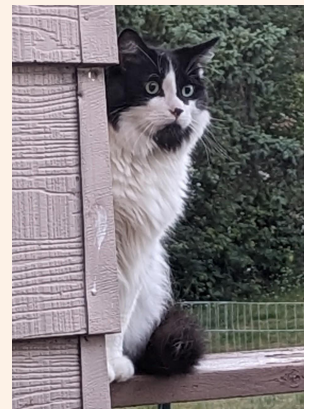
So this is everything I do as a “Church Dog.” I work hard and deserve payment in treats.

Summary

June giving was significantly higher than June 2022, and expenses were about normal for June.

At this point our position of revenue vs. expenses continues to be fine, especially if looked at on an annual basis and compared to our approved budget.

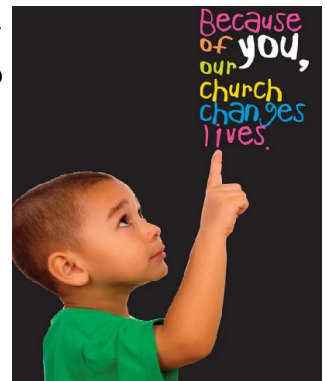
The 2024 Stewardship campaign begins in August. This campaign will be more challenging for various reasons.

1. 2023 is the last year that money will be received from the Fetzer Institute. In 2023 the Operating Budget received \$7,000, and \$7,000 went into the MRI reserve funds
2. Our 2023 budget was balanced because of a very substantial donation received at the end of last year.
3. We must plan for Pastor Torri's sabbatical in 2024.
4. Substantial expenses for the church facility are expected for later this year and for 2024.
5. Costs are increasing, and we will need substantial additional pledges and donations from our members and friends to have a balanced 2024 budget.

We plan on having Stewardship moments every Sunday in August and 2 or 3 in September. If you are willing to give a short Stewardship message as to why Union is important to you and the community, please let the Board of Financial Stewardship know.

Our theme for the Stewardship campaign is: Because of You, Our Church Changes Lives

Stewardship materials will be coming out soon. Please prayerfully consider what Union Church means to you and be as generous as possible.

CELEBRATING THE PAST: Pastors of the Church

Myra Damm, Historian

This is not old history, but on May 19, 2019 -TorriVande Zande was installed as our new pastor, and that would make her the 26th pastor to serve the congregation

Three other pastors were mentioned. In the beginning Rev Conrad who was a pastor-at-large in Northern Minnesota. John Clark from 1904-05, and A.G. Parks, 1907-1914. Since this was a new congregation still being organized, pastors from the Congregational Home Missionary Society held meetings in Hackensack. The first full-time pastor to serve was Rev. Georg Sheets, who served from 1907-1914. Rev. Sheets represented the church at a conference in Duluth and was instructed to make application for admission in the Congregational Conference,.

Rev. Arden Johnson was the 24th, who served from 1970 to retirement in 1992. He was followed by Michael Small who served from 1992 until he retired in 2017. Michael was also a youth pastor at UCC much earlier in his career. I mention these last two as they served the longest of all the pastors in the history of the church. Other pastors' terms were usually shorter. They served a couple of years and then moved on.

Torri is the first woman pastor at UCC, and she has brought new ideas as we move forward and grow as a church.

ADULT LEARNING

Linnea Dietrich

Fantastic opportunity for Self-Discovery using the Enneagram

Join us at UCC Wednesday, September 13, 9-noon to learn about yourself and the Enneagram

Carol Lawson, our facilitator for this time together, retired four years ago after serving 19 years with the Evangelical Covenant Church in Developing Leaders. Prior to that call in Chicago, she served on two different regional district staff teams. She holds a Master of Arts in Christian Education, a certificate in Spiritual Direction, a certificate in the Enneagram, and is Ordained to Word and Service. She was introduced to the Enneagram in 2001 at a Staff Team Leadership Workshop and in 2007, participated in an Enneagram training sponsored by Dr. Jerome Wagner. Since then, she has done workshops around the country for clergy groups, staff teams, seminary students, and church leaders within and outside of the Covenant Church. Some conversations with couples (engaged, recently married, or those married for many years) have also taken place, and she has observed new insights and understandings these couples gain about each other after taking the Enneagram. She enjoys talking with any size group about this tool for self-awareness.

Carol has been married to Bruce for 48 years and has two adult children and two grandchildren.

In brief, the Enneagram is an ancient pattern assimilated by the historical Christian Church to understand the nine basic people types. It has been found to be quite helpful in self-awareness and our interaction with others. It helps us understand how we are all hard-wired, and how that impacts our decisions, relationships, and general engagement of life.

The Enneagram began with oral tradition in the Middle East, was passed down through the early desert fathers and mothers, and likely came to the US by the Jesuits in the late 1960's and early 1970's. Only when it was introduced to the West did it start to become transmitted in written form for wider publication. In the last decade it has become a popular personality identifier but contains deep insights into who we are and how we relate to others, if we see it as more than a "party game."

You will be asked to take an online assessment created by Dr. Jerome Wagner. He created the WEPSS (Wagner Enneagram Personality Style Subscale) 25 years ago while a psychologist at Loyola University in Chicago. He has used it all over the world with varying ethnic groups and has revised it numerous times. The test will ask you to respond to a list of 200 words and decide where on the scale from "almost never" to "almost always" a particular word fits you. It is recommended that you do not spend a lot of time thinking about each answer but give a response to the word as it relates to you. Choose responses according to how you think you really are and have been, rather than how you should be or would like to be. This will allow the results to be a more accurate portrayal of who you are (like a mirror) rather than an obscure view of someone who does not sound like you (a verdict). The extensive report (8 pages) will provide thoughts to ponder as you uncover more of its findings.

The cost of the assessment is \$20. The final day to sign up is Friday, August 18th, as Carol, our facilitator, needs time to get the assessment to you by email, time for you to fill out the assessment and time for her to assimilate the results. You will receive your personalized inventory at the workshop.

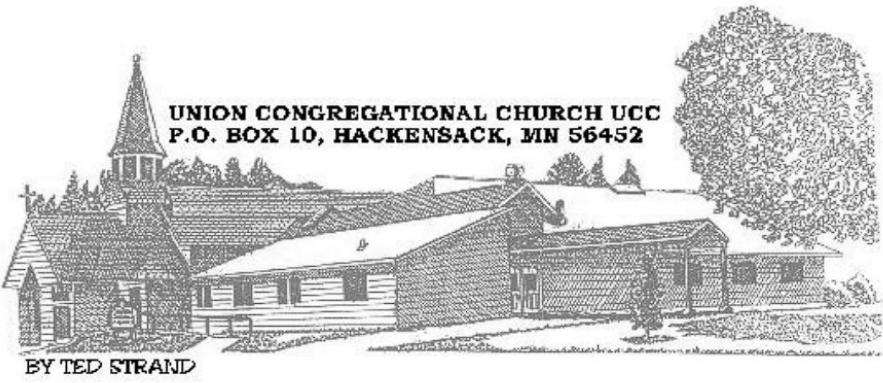
