ADULT LEARNING Linnea Dietrich

A small prayer group I am part of has been reading a book called <u>Practice of the Presence</u> by Brother Lawrence, translation by Carmen Acevedo Butcher. It is a wonderfully deep book about the importance of paying attention to seeing God and the Spirit within ourselves, in others, in nature, our circumstances, and essentially everywhere. Brother Lawrence writes, "THE most sacred and most necessary practice in the spiritual life is the presence of God." Later in the book he says, "God paints themself (meaning Jesus, the Holy Spirit and God) in the foundation of our souls." Let's just sit with that thought for a minute, or an hour, or a day. How do we see and experience this Presence that is "painted into the foundation of our soul?"

This is our intention in our prayer practice of Lectio Divina together in the library at Union Wednesday afternoons at 4 PM. We intentionally pray/meditate together on verses from the Bible as we Practice the Presence discerning what "they" are saying to us personally. You are welcome to join us in this discovery journey. If interested, give me a call or talk to Pastor Torri.

However, starting November 29th through December 20th, we will be suspending Lectio until January and doing an Advent study together called <u>Lighted Windows</u> by Margaret Silf. COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES OCTOBER 19, 2023

Marilyn called the meeting to order. The agenda was approved as written. Karen/Gunder. The minutes were approved as written. Sue/Linnea.

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report</u>: Pastor Torri highlighted several items in her report. For the Advent period, Pastor Leif and Pastor Torri have decided to bring back "The Holden Evening Prayer" using more people from the two churches to sing. If you would like to be a singer or reader for this wonderful service, please let Heidi know. On Wednesday, November 22 Tammy will be preparing a traditional Thanksgiving meal for the community. This will be well advertised and we hope the meal will attract a good crowd. On Thanksgiving Day, November 23, there will be a potluck gathering in the Friendship hall at noon for anyone looking for a meal, a chance to play games, or to watch football.

<u>Facilities:</u> The work to bury the water line into the church to prevent our water pipe freezing up in the winter has been completed. The road has been repaired and looks good. We don't know our cost of this project yet. Advantage Heating was here yesterday to check out the furnace that heats the back of the Sanctuary. No report on what they found yet. New thermostats have been installed throughout the church. Work to replace cam lights with LED lights is progressing.

<u>Personnel:</u> Chris Swenson and Connie Schmitt are looking at job descriptions, meeting with church employees, and are reviewing personnel policies and the responsibilities of the Board of Personnel.

<u>Board of Financial Stewardship</u>: Don reported that September has been a good month with income at \$14,739 and expenses at \$14,659. Our Year to Date Balance is \$26,552. As of October 18, we have received 37 pledges for a total of \$100,220. This is 80% of our 2024 goal.

Ministry Team Reports:

<u>Congregational Life:</u> Joni reported that she has called several of our homebound or out of town church members this month and has had long and wonderful conversations with them. They are often hungry for news of church and members they haven't seen. Torri spoke about the reorganization that the Congregational Life team is making. There are five important functions included in Congregational Life: Called to Care (calling, visiting), Directory and Membership, Promotion, Fellowship/Relations (Community Meals, Game Nights, Movie Nights, Dick's Jam) and Church Growth (Baptisms, Confirmation, New Members). If you have a passion for this type of ministry please consider joining this team. We need you!

<u>Worship</u>: Heidi reported that we have an average of 40 people attending in-person worship, and 6 families attending online. Approximately 9 people regularly attend the Birchview service at 1:00 on Sundays. For Advent this year we will use the Holden Evening Prayer material as we have done in the past. Multiple singers and speakers are encouraged to get involved.

<u>Adult Learning</u>: Linnea talked about the Lectio Divina group which meets weekly and is enjoying focusing and meditating on a short passage from the Bible each week. This allows for a deep dive into the meaning of the passage for each person. During Advent the Wednesday meetings will switch from Lectio Divina to the <u>Lighted Windows</u> book by Margaret Silf.

<u>Women's Fellowship</u>: Joni reported on the October meeting which featured Kirin Christianson and was very interesting. In November the women will meet at church and will travel to Nisswa for lunch and shopping. The Christmas bake sale is December 3, and the Christmas luncheon is December 14. <u>Men's Fellowship</u>: The Men's Fellowship Chili and Pie supper will be this Saturday from 5:00 to 6:30. The Women's Fellowship is helping with the event and is making pies for the meal. Proceeds from the evening will be used to purchase food for the Thanksgiving and Christmas food boxes that the men prepare each year.

<u>Justice Ministry</u> Team: Sue spoke about the water testing event the Justice Ministry Team helped with at the Hackensack Chainsaw Weekend in September. One hundred and forty people dropped off water to be tested that day. On October 24 a new book study will be available in person or by zoom. The book is called, <u>All You Ever Wanted to Know About Indians</u>, <u>But Were Afraid to Ask</u>. Contact Don Hoppe if you would like to be included in the discussion.

<u>Fundraising</u>: Steve reported that on October 9 he met with the Fundraising ministry team to discuss building use fees and other ideas for raising money for the church. Notes from the meeting aren't available yet, so this item will be discussed more thoroughly in November. Council discussed the need to have someone from the church be present when the church is being used by a group for an extended period of time to protect the church from damage. Also discussed was the need for a lock box that can be coded for events that people are having at church that allows access without giving out keys. After each event the code can be changed.

A year ago Council decided to charge \$2.00 per person when groups were coming in for church sponsored events, ie, exercise class, Dick's Jam, Bone Builders. Motion: Discontinue the \$2 charge for outreach related groups that use our building. People are free to make a "free will offering" to help cover utility costs if they so desire. Mike/Stan/passed

<u>Tech Team:</u> Mike Schmitt reported that the tech team will be sponsoring a sale of "tech" equipment that has been refurbished on Oct. 28 from 9:00am–1:00pm in the Friendship Hall at church. The event is being advertised on Facebook.

New Business:

Pastor/Parish Ministry Team: Don is interested in having the Pastor/Parish team re-organize which will make our church a more healthy church than it already is. Motion: To re-create our Pastor/Parish ministry team after re-writing the job description for the team. Don/Gunder/passed.

Old Business:

Child Care Pod Update: Cindy indicated that a very promising person was interviewed for the job of running the child care pod. It is hoped that the program can open January 2, 2024.

Adjournment: Next meeting is November 16. Clerk: Karen Holle

Summary

September giving was good, and expenses were about normal.

At this point our position of revenue vs. expenses continues to be fine, especially if looked at on an annual basis and compared to our approved budget. And we hope to have a moderate carryover for the 2024 budget.

2024 Stewardship Campaign: As of October 23, we have received 38 pledges for 2024, 35 are current pledging units (with a 5.5% increase) and 3 are new. Total pledged is \$101,720 or 81% of the \$125,000 goal. If you have not yet pledged your support, please do so as soon as possible since we have begun the budgeting process for 2024.

A Giving Statement through October will be sent out early November concerning status of 2023 pledges.

Strong completion of 2023 pledges and additional 2024 pledges are needed as we plan for next year.

JUSTICE MINISTRY TEAM

The Justice Ministry Team has been taking regenerative care of our environment by focusing on access to clean water. Our free water testing clinic in September brought 140 participants to our booth in Hackensack. Testing results indicated normal levels of nitrates and chlorides in all but a few water samples.

JMT members will be attending the Rural Organizing Project, Rural People's Agenda zoom on November 4th from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Discussion for the zoom will set an agenda for rural issues such as climate, housing, healthcare, and childcare. 

JUSTICE TEAM - HISTORIC DATE - AUGUST 1st, 2013 Richard Vanden Eykel

August 1, 2013. Why is this an important date in Minnesota's state history? On this date, it became legal for same sex marriage to be performed. From the perspective of a gay senior citizen, I never thought that I'd ever see this happen in my lifetime. As a 21-year-old in 1970, trying to fit into society's expectations, I married my first wife, and we have 2 daughters from this marriage. After being married for almost 21 years, I filed for a divorce. Then following years of dating several women, there was a second marriage ending in divorce, at the age of 45. I then lived with another woman for a short time, and when things didn't work out with her, I decided that I was finished with women.

On September 1, 2006, I was shopping at Walmart in Jamestown, North Dakota when I ran into a friend, who introduced me to his friend, and that was Gunder. Gunder and I talked, and it was obvious that we had a lot of similar interests. We became close friends, and after a period of time, I asked him to move in with me, since we were together almost daily. Three months later our apartment became infested with black mold, and we had to find a different place to live. We found the nicest little house. A few months later, my mother had issues with her care facility, so we asked her to move in with us, which she did. We were able to be a family for about 2-1/2 wonderful years, and she passed away on March 30, 2010. I was the administrator of Mom's estate, and Mom had a house located south of Akeley. Gunder and I bought my sister out, and by fall we had moved from Jamestown, North Dakota to rural Akeley!

I never expected to move back to this area, this place from my past, where people are very judgmental. For the most part though we were accepted in the community. We joined several organizations and help with community undertakings. August 1, 2013 came and went, and getting married again was the farthest thing from my mind. We headed to southern Minnesota to attend Gunder's niece's wedding, then headed to Washington, DC. I really don't know what came over me... except that being a 100% disabled Vietnam veteran meant that a spouse would provide some good health insurance and medication benefits. So over morning coffee, getting ready to travel, the following statement came blurting out of my mouth. "Who's the next person to get married in your family?" Gunder stated, "probably one of my nephews." I said, "No... How about you?!" He said, "Yes!" and we



decided on 09/01/2013 for our wedding, the 7th anniversary of our meeting. Vacation was over just in time to get our marriage license in Bloomington, Minnesota, as we didn't know what to expect in Park Rapids. We expected a total of 6 people at the wedding, and there were about 40 people who attended, with a potluck following. On that day, at the age of 64 years and 9 months, I stopped having to live 2 lives, and could focus on just being me.

In July of 2014, we decided to purchase a different home, as my medical issues made our place unlivable (small rooms and very little natural light). We found a place half a mile north of our old place and moved in completely by September.

Most of my family had little or nothing to do with us, and this became very apparent in 2016. My first cousin, Robert, was diagnosed with a brain tumor, and the prognosis wasn't good. We invited him to come live with us and we would take care of him until he passed, which was only about a month. Not one of his/my family members came to see him, and I found out later that it was because of Gunder and I being married. Also, the minister at the funeral wouldn't read the obituary as it stated that Robert was being taken care of by his cousin, Richard, and husband, Gunder.

With this in mind, we have decided that we will only be with people that are positive and supportive to our lifestyle; that being all of Gunder's family, one family of cousins, and of course our church family.




