The fox stayed in its box for about a week before I had the courage to take it out and attempt to paint it. I decided to start with the background. I thought, "If I mess up, at least it won't be noticed too much." So I sat down, picked up the brush, dipped it into a color, and I began to paint.

I quickly realized the numbers were too small. I couldn't see them. My brush glided outside of the lines on every stroke. In frustration, I put the fox back in the box, and it was stored under my bed for almost a year.

As winter set in this year, I decided to take the fox out again. I knew the numbers were small, so I began to brainstorm what I needed to do in order to see more clearly. I went into my bedroom and grabbed the lamp off my nightstand.

Then I went to the store and bought a pair of stronger reading glasses. I cleared the table, set up the lamp, put my glasses on and guess what? I could see the tiny numbers embedded in the canvas! And I started painting.

Sometimes in life there are situations that come up that seem impossible to deal with. Feelings of inadequacy, fear, and frustration often accompany those situations, and we say to ourselves, "I can't do this!"

But let me remind you of a few things:

- 1. I needed light to see the numbers on the canvas. Even though I may have been in a lighted room, I needed more light to shine down on a certain place for me to see what I needed to do. Jesus came into the world to be a Light in the world and to the world (John 1). When things get crazy and impossible... It is Jesus that gives us hope. He sheds light in the darkest places so we can see better in difficult situations.
- 2. I needed clarity to discern what numbers were represented on the canvas. I needed to purchase glasses that could help me clear up the fuzziness that lit up the numbers so I knew where to drop the paint. This is similar to the Holy Spirit working in our lives. The Spirit moves and brings us into clarity to discern what we need to do in different situations. The Spirit clears up the fuzziness!



My hope this winter season is that you bring light (Jesus Christ) and clarity (The Holy Spirit) into difficult situations that you face. And may you, Christ, and the Holy Spirit create beautiful pictures that tell your life-story.

Enlist the services of a Director that will deliver quality childcare for families in the community of Hackensack.

Serve as a representative and bridge of communication between the Director of the Childcare and Union Congregational Church-United Church of Christ.

Offer expertise and consult at the request of the Director to assist in creating an environment of care for children and families that use the services of the Childcare.

Solicit funding that will supplement the costs of providing services by seeking grants and other private donations.



COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

JANUARY 18, 2024

PRESENT: Connie Schmitt, Sue Kimmel, Cindy Gulbrandson, Heidi Hoppe, Stan Kumpula, Mary Parrish, Caryl Allan, Linnea Dietrich, Mike Schmitt, Gunder Austin, Marilyn McKnight Erickson, Don Hoppe, Karen Holle, Mike Bohanon, Pastor Torri Vande Zande, Steve Erickson (at end of meeting)

Today we walked into a newly updated Council meeting room. It looks wonderful! Thanks to Connie and Mike Schmitt and Kirin and Alan Christianson for their work!!

Marilyn called the meeting to order. The agenda was approved with one addition. The minutes were approved as written. Heidi/Connie

<u>Pastor's Monthly Report:</u> Pastor Torri submitted her report which covers the months of December and January. She emphasized how important the weekly service is to the people at Birchview Gardens next door. Fourteen people came to last week's service which is scheduled for 1:00 each Sunday. Caryl Allan coordinates volunteers to help with this service.

<u>Facilities:</u> Mike Bohanon reported that all the church fire extinguishers need checking before the Fire Marshal visits next week. Mike Schmitt will check our smoke detectors to make sure they are working. Pastor Torri asked if we could have a fire extinguisher in the sanctuary that is easy to access if needed.

<u>Personnel:</u> Connie talked about a new law in Minnesota regarding Sick and Safe Time for people who work in part-time jobs. Starting this year part-time employees earn 1 hour of sick time for every 30 hours of work. The hours may accumulate for a total of 80 hours. This cost to the church will be included in our 2024 budget.

Connie and Chris Swenson have updated the job descriptions for clerical staff and have also made a few changes to Pastor Torri's letter of call for the purpose of clarity.

Connie also is including in the new letter of call a list of the paid holidays that Pastor Torri can take off. If Torri needs to work on a holiday, she may take another day off when it works into her schedule.

<u>Board of Financial Stewardship:</u> Don reviewed the financial information for December. November and December were good months for the church financially. 47 pledges have come in with a total pledged of \$115,270.

The 2024 budget: Don added some money in the utilities budget because utility costs are going up, in part because of the child care POD. The main increase in the new budget is in the area of staff and pastor salaries. **Motion to approve an increase in office personnel salaries to \$18 per hour. Connie/Linnea.** We have two people doing office work for us, for a total of 21 hours a week.

Connie Schmitt, representing The Board of Personnel, talked about changes she would like to see in Pastor Torri's salary and housing allowance. Connie suggested that Torri's housing allowance should be increased from \$17,520 to \$19,110 to meet the guidelines set down by the Minnesota Conference. She also suggested that Torri's salary be increased from \$41,212 to \$46,340 which meets the guidelines from the Conference for pastors with Torri's experience (Step C) and a congregation of our size. Motion: To accept Don's budget for 2024 for a total of \$209,981. Don/Marilyn/passed. This budget will be taken to the semi-annual meeting on January 28.

Ministry Team Reports:

Congregational Life: There was some discussion today that the Community Meal program which is currently under Congregational Life should really be part of the Community Outreach program. People who attended the community meal yesterday indicated that many people who asked for food seemed pretty desperate for a good meal. Approximately 40 people are being served each night we have community meal.

During Lent, the Lutheran Church would like to have soup at their church on the days that the service is in their sanctuary. We decided that we would continue our meal program for people in the community who would probably not go over to St. Paul's church for food. Mike B., Gunder, Tammy, and Caryl will be part of the team to keep the meals available at Union.

Worship: Heidi reported that in the past 8 weeks, there has been an average of 37 in-house worshipers on Sunday, 11 households on line, and 10 people attending the Birchview service. In February, Laura Baum-Parr will preach for us on two occasions. During Torri's sabbatical many people at church have volunteered to preach in her absence.

Adult Learning: Linnea mentioned that between 9 and 14 people attend Lectio Divina on a weekly basis. She has submitted a grant for the local El Camino she would like to organize for this summer and should hear soon if she is awarded funds for it.

<u>Women's Fellowship:</u> The congregation enjoyed a wonderful luncheon in December sponsored by Women's Fellowship. There is no meeting in January.

Men's Fellowship: The Men's Fellowship is considering canceling their monthly meeting, and instead getting together to work on projects at church. Stan feels it is time for a new leader of Men's Fellowship.

<u>Justice Ministry Team:</u> Current projects include: Helping with Sunday services at Birchview Gardens and also helping on Saturdays with activities for the residents.

The Justice Ministry Team is also working with Mike Tauber to co-sponsor grants to improve drinking water quality. Sue is looking for a co-leader of JMT.

<u>Fundraising:</u> In Steve's absence, Karen talked about the Northwoods Arts Council's recent request to determine what their costs will be next August when they use space at the church for their art and book fair. **Motion: To approve the building request form/rental agreement that Steve presented in November, 2023. Karen/Connie/passed.**

Other thoughts regarding the Northwoods Arts Council event: Add into the cost of using our space a \$75 charge for janitorial services. We will have someone on site throughout the day and will make sure bathrooms are clean and stocked. The cost for the Friendship Hall includes tables and chairs. We also agree that only service dogs and the church dog are allowed in the building during the event.

<u>Tech Team:</u> The Friendship Hall now has only LED lights. They are very bright and do not all have to be turned on to have adequate light in the room.

A new mixer has been installed in the Sanctuary which allows for more microphones when we have special music and ease of control for the sound team. Thank you, Mike Schmitt, for all you have done to improve technology at our church!

Outreach: Torri reviewed the job description for the outreach team. Community Meal will be part of this program, and other projects will follow. This is a work in progress.

<u>Moderator Moment:</u> Marilyn has just finished chemotherapy and is grateful for the support she has received through this process. She feels that a lot is happening in the church that is having a positive effect on the Hackensack community.

Old Business:

Woock-Ness Property: The contract for the sale of this property has been signed, and the closing is scheduled for February 12. The congregation will vote at the semi-annual meeting to pass a resolution to go through with the sale. A 2/3 majority of those present at the special meeting must agree to the resolution for the sale to move forward.

Child Care Pod Update: An open house for the new child care pod is scheduled for February 5, and the program will open mid February.

New Business:

Church Constitution update: Karen and Torri are working on this, and it is going well.

Sabbatical Planning: The team involved with this will meet January 31 to plan for Pastor Torri's sabbatical which begins August 12, 2024.

Solar Panels: Don reported that this project will get back on track this year.

Meeting Adjourned: Next meeting is February 15. Clerk, Karen Holle

Summary

Income was good and expenses were high in December.

Giving and extra donations were very good this year, pledges mostly completed, and we finished the year with a good carryover to 2024. We also had \$14,000 in other donations that were used to pay for special facilities costs concerning the water connection to the church to avoid freeze-up problems.

2024 Stewardship Campaign: As of December 31, we had received 47 pledges; 42 are current pledging units (with a 5.9% increase), and 5 are new. Total pledged is \$115,270 or 92% of the \$125,000 goal.

The 2024 budget was reviewed by the Executive Committee and presented to the Council. It was slightly modified and will be presented to the congregation, with a recommendation from the Church Council for approval, at the Semi-Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 28.

Celebrating the Past: Formation of Faith in Action

Our current director is Theresa Eclov, with the offices right here in Hackensack.

Mike Tauber is seeking grant funding for bioremediation of chemically contaminated ground water through the Reg. Sustainable Dev. Partnership. The UCC Justice Ministry Team has been listed as a sponsor of this grant.

Sue is seeking church council support to add another person as JMT leader. This person will be a co-leader so events/attendance continues when Sue is unable to participate in activities.




