### Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande Sab-ba.... what?

Sabbatical! From August 15th to November 15th I will be on a 3-month sabbatical. I know many people think a sabbatical is a 3-month vacation, but it is far from that. A sabbatical is a time of rest and renewal for pastors. It is time to focus on our relationship with God, our commitment to our call to ministry, and create a renewed vision and focus for our lives and for ministry. A sabbatical is not a vacation, but it is time away from the daily work of ministry. Oftentimes, sabbaticals include



continuing education, but the first goal is reconnecting to God and vocation through rest, reflection, and prayer.

I am very thankful to the congregation for allowing me this sabbatical. When I was first hired, it was stated in my call agreement that I would take a 3-month sabbatical every 5 years. I cannot tell you how much this means to me.

I would like to share with you questions I will explore during those 3 months.



### **COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**

### MARCH 21, 2024 (DRAFT not approved yet by Council)

**PRESENT:** Pastor Torri, Mary Parrish, Stan & Joni Kumpula, Don & Heidi Hoppe, Mike Bohanon, Mike Schmitt, Gunder Austin, Steve & Marilyn Erickson, Sue Kimmel, Linnea Dietrich, Cindy Gulbrandson, Judy Hoopman (Linda Ottman for a brief update on the newsletter and Connie Schmitt via Zoom)

Marilyn called the meeting to order. The February minutes were approved. Heidi/Linnea

**Discussion of electronic option to Union News** – Linda reported contact with the post office about pricing and policy changes on bulk mailing as of April 1, 2024. She has been surveying members about preferences for mail vs. electronic "Union News." **Motion** to not renew the bulk rate, send by email and regular mail to those who have replied, and to give it two more months to inform members of options for receiving "Union News." Linnea/Don; approved.

Pastor's Monthly Report: Update on the March 28<sup>th</sup> Seder Meal, and Birchview Church. Birchview Church continues to go well, and Torri and volunteers are making Easter baskets to give to residents. Tammy is providing Easter dinner at Union, and service at Birchview is also planned. Torri invited anyone who is interested to accompany her to Birchview. Torri submitted her formal request for her sabbatical. Jen Buie has asked Torri about a letter of commitment for the "RALLY," an organization through WHA School that is about suicide prevention, trauma work, and other supports for youth. RALLY is interested in a presence in our community. Torri will get more information about what a commitment entails. Motion: Torri will advise the Executive Council about signing the letter of commitment if appropriate. Don/Stan approved

**Personnel:** Connie reported approval of Torri's Letter of Call for 2024 by the Executive Committee. Measures are in place to gather needed signatures.

Facilities: Mike Bohanon: Spring clean-up date has not yet been decided. Mike is in the process of contacting the local youth about lawn mowing this summer. Informed council on the toilet repairs which have been completed by Tauber Plumbing for \$600. Recommends that church (outside) needs painting in the near future, signage needs repairs/paint. Mike asked permission to solicit bids for the church portion and will also talk to Greg Webb about the sign, which he made. Discussion to upgrade sound system in Friendship Hall. Motion: To designate \$1000 for upgrade. Don/Gunder; approved. TDS is upgrading fiber optics at no cost to UCC. Steve brought up the insurance policies are due for renewal and should be reviewed including the childcare policy which needs clarification. Commercial insurance policy expires April 1, and Steve (with Connie & Mike B) is reviewing this, possible deductible increases. Will inform the Executive Committee.

**Board of Financial Stewardship:** Don provided a report update of the current operating income & expenses to date. February income was good - \$24,175.87; maintaining a good balance – YTD \$33,684.97. Shifted funds due to an additional \$2000 from Fetzer Institute; increased \$1000 to operating budget (total of \$5000) and increase of \$1000 to the MRI fund. Has developed an Investment Team with 5 other members to consider ways to maximize best investment strategies for church money that sits in current accounts; looking for high interest savings or investment accounts. Don also reported \$1600 donated to the Hackensack Food Shelf through donations and Lenten Service offerings.

**Ministry Team:** There are 49 individuals signed up for March 28<sup>th</sup> Seder Meal. Torri provided a letter to Council requesting her sabbatical. **Motion:** To accept Torri's request. Linnea/Mike approved.

**Congregational Life:** Need to set up an April meeting for planning – connections with the elderly, send out Easter cards, etc. Issue with name tags, out of magnet ones, will discuss ordering more. Summer Union 101 Class will meet 4 times starting July 14<sup>th</sup>.

**Worship:** Numbers for February: 33 average, 10 online, and 11 Birchview. Liturgy readings – others are agreeing to do, April 21 Torri will manage the streaming and Steve will lead worship. Torri is working on "Love Matters More" as a May theme for unity within our political climate.

**Adult Learning:** Linnea reports study course of <u>The Bible in 52 Weeks for Women</u> has about 9 people interested and will begin April 3, from 11:15 to 12:45 in the Library and will meet every other week. Lectio continues to meet weekly and will go back to the 4 PM time after Easter. The Hackensack Camino project has 6 committed people, and Linnea and team will open the enrollment to area community churches in April.

**Women's Fellowship:** Joni reports they continue to meet the second Thursday monthly. Planned events include gardening with Mary Parrish in April, visit to Stone Woman Herbals in May. Women's Fellowship gave \$1000 for new blinds in the Friendship Hall, Gunder volunteered to help with installation. Fiber Arts group meets the 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday monthly in the library, and Joni is calling for others to join the group.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reports they are continuing with no regular monthly meetings but planning a list of possible summer activities including local road trips. Volunteers are packing Easter food boxes to be distributed. Men's Fellowship is planning for a second Chili/Pie Supper in October.

**Justice Ministry:** Sue reports they have completed the current book study. Developing a letter-writing campaign for support of healthy environmental activities like reduction of plastics. Working on a June 23<sup>rd</sup> forum at the church which will include lunch. St. Paul's Lutheran and Walker Community Church will be invited. Justice Ministry is assisting on Sundays at the Birchview Church Services. Birchview has brought up whether our volunteers need to have criminal background checks in order to volunteer at Birchview. May 17 & 18 is the scheduled Community Clean-Up, and volunteers are needed for organizing and serving the food. There will be music and appreciation at the 3 PM closing after clean-up.

Fundraising: Steve reports Community Meals will stop at the end of May for the summer but will resume in September. He proposes a monthly meal for June, July, and August such as a BBQ. Plans for summer fundraising are in development. Questions about Kokoro's rental with UCC, no lease agreement signed yet. Mike S agreed to contact Kiki and Greg on this. Steve recommends increasing awareness in the community about the option of renting our Friendship Hall for activities especially with our updating the technology available and good kitchen facilities. Gary Dietrich sent a letter about the childcare facility at UCC, stating enrollment is slow, and advertising is needed. Request for prorating the rent for February since daycare began mid month. Motion was made to give a grace period for half the month. Gunder/Don approved. Also nurse's room and the room that has the recording equipment need painting which could be done at the same time the other exterior work is being done. Mike S agreed to contact Greg and Kiki about moving the recording equipment.

**Tech Team:** Mike Schmitt reported the need to beef up security with Cloud licensing (cost \$100 annually) and cameras which will alert staff if smoke or CO2 detectors go off or if there is movement after hours. Work is being done to improve sound in Sanctuary and sound equipment in Fellowship Hall.

**Outreach:** March Food Drive has been successful and is still ongoing. We have until April 8<sup>th</sup> to deliver funds with eligibility for the matching funds. Meeting is scheduled for April 17<sup>th</sup> for developing policy and procedures for the community meals & fundraising and promotion of meals. Also discussed funding Safe Serve training for Tammy, John, and others.

**Moderator Moment:** Marilyn gave a heartfelt thank you to all for the prayers and understanding as she continues her journey with recovering health.

Newsletter Deadline is Tuesday March 27<sup>th</sup> for April's newsletter.

**Child Care Pod Update:** Safety concerns were discussed for the use of the outdoor area. Traffic around the church and to the dog park are issues. The Team is asking to move the playground onto the grass, include a fence and limit traffic around the church during childcare hours. The Child Care Board will discuss and develop recommendations including funding for the fence.

Sue is asking for Council support for Pastor Parish Ministry Team. Questions arose: what is the plan, communication? Recommended that the Executive Team needs to meet, discuss, and develop recommendations to present next month.

**Old Business:** Church Constitution needs to be ready for presentation to the congregation by June 1<sup>st</sup>. Sabbatical Planning meeting is scheduled for April 1.

**Motion to adjourn meeting:** Stan/Joni; Torri provided the Benediction. Next Council meeting will be April 18<sup>th</sup>. Notes submitted by Judy Hoopman

### Celebrating the Past: Change of Pastors

Pastor Arden Johnson was pastor at the UCC Church for one of longest term of any of our pastors. He joined the church in 1970 as the 24th pastor and served 22 years. In 1957, we were yoked with the Walker Community Church and had an associate pastor, Rev. Ray Singleton who was serving as an interim pastor. He was replaced in 1984, and Pastor Michael Small was hired as an associate pastor to help serve both churches.

In 1991, the congregation voted to break the yoke with the Community Church in Walker. The separation of the two churches progressed very amicably, and the separation of the two churches was completed in 1992.

In 1991, Arden Johnson retired. Michael Small was selected to become the full-time pastor who then served 25 years as the UCC pastor.

In March of 1992, the separation of the two churches was completed, and Union Congregational Church became independent, and Michael Small continued as our full-time pastor.

### Summary


The \$60,000 gift to the Bequests and Special Gifts Fund received in late December has been invested. Money from the sale of the Woock-Ness property was received in February.


Funds from the Fetzer Institute were also received. The undesignated amount is \$16,000. \$5,000 went into the operating budget and \$11,000 into the Reserve Maintenance, Repair & Improvement Fund (MRI). These amounts were modified from what was approved at the February Council meeting, because the total funds received was greater than expected.



### MODERATOR'S MOMENT

Spring, the season of new life, is trying to arrive! The celebration of Easter continues toward the Ascension. We will soon move beyond the dark, cold days of winter and into the bright sun of joy and promise. We are all so blessed as members of this church's warm, caring, diverse community, where we can always feel the Creator's presence. Yet, we know that we each have our private differences, and no one can doubt that we live in a difficult time in our beloved country, where diverse views can create difficult and sometimes toxic divisions.

As mediators, we have learned much about differences, and how differences can separate people from each other, and how our differences are an opportunity for positive change and growth. In church, we seldom discuss our differences and rather stay focused on the love and care we have for each other. That is fine, unless differences grow into outright conflicts that could begin to separate us from each other. Fortunately, we have escaped the type of destructive conflict that some Churches and Community organizations have experienced.

Our UCC Denomination website emphasizes how the entire community of over 5,000 churches and nearly one million members across the US "serves God in the co-creation of a just and sustainable world" ...continuing, it says: "We are a church that welcomes and accepts everyone as they are where your mind is nourished as much as your soul." The section on who we are ends with some pretty potent words: "We are a church where Jesus the Healer meets Jesus the Revolutionary and where together, we grow a just and peaceful world."

As co-moderators, we would like to grow a just and peaceful world. But, in doing so, differences of opinion will doubtless emerge about how "revolutionary" we must be in achieving that just and peaceful world. If we are to be a church of healers as well as revolutionaries, we will likely have differences in our goals, our methods, and our beliefs about what is best for our community and for the world. As we move beyond the dark, cold days of winter and into the bright sun of joy and promise, we should be ready to find ways to be both healers and revolutionaries. It does not have to be one or the other, but rather "yes. . .and."

As co-moderators, we would like to share more with our faith community some of the tools and concepts we have learned in mediating every imaginable conflict during the past 45 years. Through this Moderator's Moment, we invite you to comment on how Union Congregational might carry forward as one church, yet with many diverse views, and differing opinions as well as fears about conflict. A good question to start with is "What does it means to have difficult conversations while acting as "healers and revolutionaries" spreading the hope and meaning of Easter to our diverse community here in Hackensack as well as in the world?


