Pastoral Letter by Steve Erickson

The Reason Union Exists, the Reason We Need It and Why We Can't Live Without It

Thanks to the entire tech team for the high quality work they do which allowed Marilyn and me to view the entire Sunday service online the last Sunday of September. Without it, we would not have been able to write this message, but most importantly, we would have missed the important benefit of the community we drove to be with that morning. We almost missed Gary and Waldo's reminders about the whole purpose of why we donate our time, our talents and our treasures to Union Congregational Church, and what we receive back from that effort.

We started out that morning with great intentions and made it to the church parking lot just in time to hear Lynn Van Allen ringing the bell. As we found a pew in the back, we heard Waldo Eisinger start with a stewardship message focusing on the pain of Covid isolation, followed by Gary Kwong's impromptu stewardship moment that focused on the death of one of his most important relationships; his child. We had to leave just before the passing of the peace (Marilyn, unfortunately, started feeling sick again, as has been the case

with her medical struggles off and on during the past year). But, as I drove us both back home, I thought about how both Gary and Waldo provided reasons that deeply resonated with us, and perhaps for many others who experience life's hardships, in whatever form they are dealt to us.

Waldo talked about the isolation he and his family experienced with Covid, and then his cancer diagnosis and treatment created a further year of isolation. Gary talked about the death of his son. Both messages were not just about pain, but more so about the importance of the supporting and loving community our UCC congregation provides.

Waldo told a story about his daughter and her grandfather going to the hardware store to buy important items. As his daughter brought to the checkout some Chicklets gum, (which she claimed she would even share with Grandpa), Grandpa asked her three questions: Do you need it, can you afford it, and can you live without it? As to the gum, she responded, "I could probably live without it," and then added, "but I wouldn't be happy!"

Applying these three questions about sharing our time, our talents and our treasure (code for money) with our church community, Waldo gave the same answer as his daughter. However, I would take it a step further and say that not only would Marilyn and I be unhappy, our lives would be dramatically different. We would likely not know any of the people who now rate as dear friends who make up our important community support system. We would not experience the happiness and love of those who have reached out to us during our cancer journey. Like Jimmy Stewart's character in the movie "It's a Wonderful Life," without the UCC community, we would probably be able to live without Union Church, but the journey would be quite lonely and quite different.

Gary read our community prayer which speaks to the "Reason we exist and why we cannot live without Union, let alone not be happy:

May our harmonies extend beyond our songs. May our distinctiveness be welcomed, our identities be celebrated, and our differences be a source of delight.

This life of faith is lived in community where many gifts support the body of Christ. We help others, we are transformed in love. May our church serve as a beacon for belonging and demonstrate the beloved community of the kingdom in your name this day and every day. Transform our hearts and stir our souls. Foster a spirit of curiosity, hospitality, and reconciliation to make things right with our neighbors, foes and friends. Lead us on the path of belonging. Amen.

When we feel overwhelmed, afraid, when we stumble and fail, even when we realize that some of us hold differing political views, or have ideas or beliefs that are radically different than our own, we continue to support each other because as a community of faith, we have a greater purpose than in our isolation from each other. And as Gary Kwong urged in his impromptu stewardship moment, this Community of Care and Service is the here and now, and as Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount, the kingdom of heaven is now.

Let's commit to going forward in love and community, remembering that we might be unhappy without Union, but we would also be missing the experience of living in the new community of faith as expressed by Jesus in the Gospels.



COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

SEPTEMBER 19, 2024 DRAFT (Not yet approved by council)

PRESENT: Karen Holle, Heidi and Don Hoppe, Mike Bohanon, Marilyn and Steve Erickson, Caryl Allan, Pastor Sheila Hunter, Sue Kimmel, Joni and Stan Kumpula, Linnea Dietrich, Mike Schmitt, Connie Schmitt and Gunder Austin by Zoom.

Marilyn called the meeting to order. Pastor Sheila offered a devotional.

The agenda was approved as written. The minutes were approved as written. Heidi/Joni

Sabbatical Update: The general feeling of the group is that the church is doing well regarding the quality of the worship service and administration in general thus far in Pastor Torri's sabbatical.

Board of Facilities: Most of the painting on the outside of the church has been completed by Mark Johnson. Mike reported that Superior Fuel is now our propane company, offering quite a discount compared to Ferrellgas.

Discussion of moving from a cleaning company back to having a custodian cleaning the church – We have had our current cleaning company for about two years. The annual cost is about \$7,200, and there are concerns that much of the church is not being cleaned at all (downstairs) or that some areas of the upstairs are not being cleaned well. Tammy Lindberg is interested in having a job at the church as custodian and is preparing a list of jobs she would perform and what she would want to be paid. Motion: Council authorizes Connie to meet with Tammy to discuss her interest in having a job at the church keeping the building clean. Mike/Caryl

Board of Financial Stewardship: Don presented his report for the month of August to Council. Total income for the month was \$8,664, and expenses were \$11,953. We currently have a positive balance of \$14,428 for the year. The 2025 Stewardship campaign continues. Please prayerfully consider what Union Church means to you and our community and make your pledge soon. Thank you.

Congregational Life: Caryl is happy with the job the team is doing to contact church members that are unable to come to a church service.

Worship: Heidi reported that in-person average attendance for the month was 50, with 10 online participants. There are also 10 or more participants regularly at the Birchview Church. We discussed the quality of the services, especially this past week's service with the Camino participants taking part. Linnea spoke a bit about the wonderful experience people had who participated in the Hackensack Camino. She would like to offer another Camino opportunity next summer.

Women's Fellowship: Last month Women's Fellowship met at Cindy's house to make gift bags and cards. The October meeting will focus on wine tasting.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that the chili and pie event planned for October has been canceled since money for the annual food baskets has already been raised. He is working hard to plan events for this next year.

Justice Ministry: Sue reported on the many events her group is involved in. (see her report in the newsletter). In October the team will sponsor an informational forum for the two candidates competing for the County Commissioner job for our district. On October 8, there will be a forum at WHA school on the opioid epidemic in Cass County.

Fundraising: Suggestions were made today for possible fundraising activities for the church. Steve will bring his team together for a meeting that will include Pastor Sheila who offered to be part of a discussion.

Tech Team: Mike Schmitt reported that the grand piano sounds better with the new microphone. New LED lights have been ordered for the cross. People are needed to help with slides during the Sunday services.

Outreach: The most recent fundraiser meal served dinner to 90 people. After covering costs, \$600 was given to the Hackensack Lending Library Restoration project. Discussion was held regarding the need to get more publicity for this outreach work. Also discussed the need to coordinate volunteers for these meals in a more efficient manner.x

Moderator's Moment: Marilyn shared her concerns about the divisiveness we are experiencing in our country right now and shared a handout entitled, "50 questions you can ask friends and relatives in political arguments," by Kenneth Cloke. The questions can help make political conversations more productive if we find ourselves talking with friends and relatives we may disagree with.

Old business: Carpet cleaning will start soon in the Friendship Hall now that the Camino is over.

Gunder reported that the new pastor-parish team will be meeting very soon.

New Business: Pastor Sheila spoke about World Communion Sunday which is celebrated on October 6. This is an important day because it helps us understand that we are connected to all Christians around the world. Pastor Sheila will be worshiping with us on that day.

Meeting adjourned. Next meeting is October 17. Clerk, Karen Holle

Summary

August income was again low, but our expenses were also lower than normal. At this point, our income balance for the year and our ability to meet our operating budget remains questionable. We are looking more closely at our expenses, especially regarding facilities, which are greater than expected and budgeted. Also, giving during the summer months has been less than expected. Good giving and completion of pledges is critical to have a balanced 2024 budget.

The 2025 Stewardship campaign continues. We had Stewardship Moments the last two Sundays of September and will possibly have one the second Sunday of October. Please prayerfully consider what Union Church means to you and our community and make your pledge if you haven't yet done so. At this time, we are below last year in both number of pledges received and the amount pledged.

We expect that the 2025 budget will be challenging. We request pledges in August and September when more people are present, and at our October Council meeting the Board of Financial Stewardship will begin working on the 2025 budget as we have a more accurate idea of our proposed income and expenses for 2025.

FROM THE DESK OF KNIGHT THE SERVICE DOG

When Richard, Gunder and I became members of the congregation, it was discussed with Torri about me shedding continuously and we wanted to make it as easy as possible for the cleaning staff, so it was decided that this would be the best solution for all involved.

I'm sure that if Patriot Assistance Dogs (P.A.D.) staff would see this picture, Richard would probably be reminded that when a Service Dog is working in a public place that they aren't allowed on the furniture, but it was decided by the powers that be, as a member of Union Congregational Church it was my right to sit in my pew.





Celebrating the Past: Early Years Myra Damm, Historian

As more members were joining the church, there was a need for a building to house the new congregation. Up to this point meetings were held at the Otterson Hotel and various other places.

On June 16,1914, plans were finalized to build a church on Lot 9 Block 3 in Hackensack. The building was to be 24 X 40 with an 8-foot entry. A committee of three was set up to work out the plan. Henry Bahrt, Pete Linnenberg, and Frank Wagner served on the committee.

On September 2, 2014, the committee hired Guy Beardsley to oversee the work. The foundation was finished in 1915, and in April of 1917 the building was started. When the walls were erected, it was estimated that to finish \$1650.00 was needed. The congregation raised \$900.00.

A letter was sent to the Congregational Society of New York City requesting \$750.00. The grant was allowed, and the building was completed on September 2, 1917.




