Moderator's Moment

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran Pastor and Theologian and author of many books including Ethics, Letters and Papers from Prison, The Cost of Discipleship, Life Together, and others. He was imprisoned by the Nazis during WWII for his outspoken opposition to the treatment of the Jews, and Hitler personally signed his death order after believing that Bonhoeffer had assisted the group that plotted his assassination, although there was no proof linking Bonhoeffer directly to the plot. Bonhoeffer was hanged in April of 1945, just 13 days before his concentration camp was liberated by the American Army.

I became interested in his writings when I was a student at Union Seminary in 1968-1970. Bonhoeffer felt that Christians have a duty to act as Christ would, to follow the Sermon on the Mount, and to act in the world as disciples of Christ, as well as to speak up against injustice and oppression, and to always show compassion for the poor.

I have been asked to speak on Bonhoeffer's relevance for today at Community Church of Walker UCC Adult Education Sunday class (after the worship service), sometime in May. We will let our members and friends at Union Church know of the date as soon as we have that information.

In the fall of 1932, as he was about to leave for America and study at Union Seminary, Bonhoeffer was appointed a lecturer in Theology at Berlin University. In one of his first lectures, a student recorded his words in his notebook: "He pointed out that nowadays we often ask ourselves whether we still need the Church, whether we still need God. But this question, Bonhoeffer said, is wrong. We are the ones who are questioned. The church exists and God exists, and we are asked whether we are willing to be of service, for God needs us."

REMEMBERING OUR MISSIONS

Did you know... the United Church of Christ has five areas of mission work that our local churches can give to?

<u>Our Church's Wider Mission</u> - Gifts from congregations like ours to OCWM Basic Support make it possible for our Conferences and the National Ministries to strengthen local churches and leaders and engage in mission well beyond our little community.

Most of our OCWM Basic Support dollars remain in our Minnesota Conference to help local congregations thrive. Directly supporting our churches includes one-on-one mentoring, conflict transformation, resourcing leaders as they reimagine ministry, and grants to churches.

<u>One Great Hour of Sharing</u> - This mission connects us to disaster relief, refugee assistance, and development efforts around the globe. When disasters strike, or when individuals are displaced due to violence or poverty, OGHS ensures immediate response and ongoing recovery.

Through our support, OGHS funds comprehensive development programs in areas such as healthcare, education, agriculture, food security, micro financing, and women's empowerment. An offering is typically taken on the last Sunday in March.

<u>Strengthen the Church</u> - Conferences in the national setting equally share the gifts given by members and friends through their local congregations. The funds raised support leadership development, new churches, youth ministry, and innovation in existing congregations. An offering is typically taken on the first Sunday in June.

<u>Neighbors in Need</u> - This mission focuses on social justice issues. This year's focus is on Mental Health Justice. In 2015, the General Synod of the UCC passed a resolution to become WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged) for mental health. A just world for all is a world where the human rights and well-being of people with mental health challenges are respected, no matter who you are or where you are in life's mental health journey. An offering is taken on the first Sunday of October.

<u>The Christmas Fund</u> - This mission aids many small-church retirees, surviving spouses, or those who need financial assistance after a difficult diagnosis. The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks each December to our lower-income retirees. An offering is taken each week through the month of December.



COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES (DRAFT)

APRIL 17, 2025 (Minutes are not yet approved by the council)

Present: Pastor Torri, Steve and Marilyn Erickson, Cindy Gulbrandson, Caryl Allan, Joni and Stan Kumpula, Linnea Dietrich, Mike and Connie Johnson-Schmitt, Mike Bohanon, Sue Kimmel, Gunder Austin, and Judy Hoopman

Call to Order by Marilyn McKnight-Erickson

Pastor Torri offered a brief prayer

No changes to agenda, motion to accept agenda by Sue, seconded by Connie, approved.

Motion to accept last month's minutes by Gunder, seconded by Connie and approved.

Pastor's Monthly Report: Pastor Torri submitted a written report of her activities over the past month. She spoke about the prep for the Seder which has gone very well. Lent Services with St. Paul's are wrapping up this week, with Easter on Sunday. Two new members joined our church this past Sunday and were very warmly received. Pastor Torri talked about her involvement in the planning for the Minnesota Conference Annual Meeting on June 13 & 14 and is encouraging interested people to contact her about attending. The Bible Study will have a final session May 1, and there will be some planning for a "next study" in the future.

New Business: Sue nominated Connie Schmitt to fill the Clerk vacancy, seconded by Linnea and approved by all.

BOARD TEAM REPORTS:

Board of Financial Stewardship: Don Hoppe was not present, Caryl Allan provided a short update. The month has gone well, and the system has good check-and-balance in place with Don, Sheryl, and Caryl's roles. March Food Shelf drive brought in about \$2,044.

Board of Facilities: Mike reported he has not yet gotten the bids for the roofing but expects to meet with the roofer on Monday and should have the bids by the May Council meeting. He has no update on the wall.

Personnel Board: Connie states the Call Letter has not yet been returned. Marilyn and Steve are updating language about resolution processes. This will be presented to the Executive Committee for review and approval to bring to Council.

MINISTRY TEAM REPORTS

Adult Learning: Lectio is in its 3rd year and is going well. Bible Study has been well received. May 31st Laura Baum-Parr and Stacy Hirshi will host a partial-day retreat (rocks and prayer). Hackensack Camino is in the planning and recruiting phase. Laura Baum-Parr may offer a "Sacred Space" retreat later in the summer. Bonnie Mitsch will be resuming her Dream Group work in mid May.

Congregational Life: Caryl shared the gifts given to the new members of mugs as a welcoming. Sign has been repainted by Caryl's husband. Caryl made a plea for more participation to help with Sunday Birchview services. One more volunteer one time each month would greatly be appreciated.

Fundraising/ Outreach: Team meeting is planned for sometime in May, all are welcome.

Justice Ministry: Sue provided a written report. She highlighted information about the Leech Lake Culture Alliance and partnership with KinsWomen in strengthening relationships. The Rural Organization Project with McKenzie Folly and the work with childcare, affordable housing, and healthcare was described. On May 5th there will be an event in Walker by the lighthouse in City Park called "Turn the Light Red" regarding missing indigenous women. There is a bill in works going to the MN Senate regarding protection of wild rice from pesticides, boats, and other potential harms. Sue encouraged contacting the legislature. May 17th is Community Clean-Up from 9-12 with a light breakfast provided. May 1st will be the JMT zoom meeting with discussion of alternative leadership plans as Sue leaves her position.

Women's Fellowship: Women's Fellowship continues to meet at 1:00 every 2nd Thursday of the month. They have been assisting with prep for the Seder. May's meeting will highlight Cindy and Mike's presentation on their trip to Australia.

Men's Fellowship: Stan shared the meeting at the Corner Café was productive. Men's Fellowship is committed to assisting with church events as needed, helping with work projects for members in need, staying in contact with one another, and to have fun through activities and field trips. Stan proposes a rotating leadership from participants every three months.

Tech Team: Mike reported the recent priority has been replacing all cameras so they are all the same.

Worship: In Heidi's absence Torri shared that Brian Wicker has become involved in singing at Sunday services and with the Worship Team. Sherry Toenjes has expressed interest in assisting with Sunday communion.

Moderator's Moment: Steve shared his work and interest in learning about Dietrich Bonhoeffer and his view on Christianity as related to the events in Berlin in 1932 prior to the Navi takeover and WWII. Steve will be hosting a discussion at Walker's Community Church in May. He shared a quote from Bonhoeffer.

Old business: Childcare – a written report was submitted from Gary Dietrich. Mike B. has agreed to be the point person for Ashley Hunter if she has facility concerns that need to be addressed. Great Start Childcare has 10 children currently. Ashley will provide a proposal to the Council about rent at the May meeting.

Solar Update: Mike S. presented a summary of findings about the project, cost estimate, timeline for construction, location, and other details. He outlined the cost savings for the church as well as the expenses and a plan for using existing money the church has in reserve. Mike made a motion that \$122,000 be allocated to this project immediately which will allow the church to obtain a rebate from MN Power of about \$30,000. Don Hoppe has looked at the budget and how funding will be designated. Sue seconded the motion, and the Council approved. It was brought up that Ashley Hunter should be informed about the work plan in relation to the childcare exterior area.

Pastor Torri provided a benediction.

Bible School was held in the summer to give religious instruction to the youth in the church. This was usually held for a week with Bible stories and Bible themes being a part of the program. The teachers were members of the congregation who volunteered to assist or teach. Classes were held by age groups from preschool to 8th grade. Craft projects, lessons, songs, storytelling, and outdoor activities made this a week of fun and religious instruction.

The first mention of Bible School in my records was in 1951, with an enrollment of 17. Vacation Bible School continued for many years with our church alternating with St. Paul's Lutheran Church each year. Slowly the attendance became less as there were less children, and unfortunately Vacation Bible School has not been done in the past few years, but it has provided fond memories to all who attended in their youth.




